Don't Forget International Trading Standards

s the Society's British Isles Secretary, I regularly hear complaints from European members about trading standards of our members.

Some members in Europe complain they are sent damaged and clearly worthless stamps, such as highly common U.S. definitives. For this there can be no excuse, and anyone who sends such material should realize they are jeopardizing not only their trades but the well-being of the Society as well.

Unfortunately I know full well that these members are not exaggerating. When I belonged to the swap circuits I was often dismayed at the poor condition of the stamps. It was all too common to find stamps with gaping holes in them, or huge tears, creases, pulled perforations, and other less blatant problems that nonetheless made the stamps uncollectible.

But some British and European members also complain about what might be less clear-cut, but still serious problems. One member, who recently decided to give the Society another chance after resigning a couple of years ago, said he was dismayed that U.S. members used very common stamps on their envelopes, or even the pink-and-white courier labels. How would you like to receive these labels instead of good stamps?

Even more astonishingly, he said, was a cheapskate member who put his mail in the company mailroom, whereupon it received the firm's meter cancellation. Perhaps it is time to point out that the word "stamp" figures prominently in the name of our Society.

Yet another problem stems from differences in

trading in North America and Western Europe. Many European collectors want only "very fine used" stamps. Unfortunately, some members either ignore this stipulation or, as is understandable, do not understand what Europeans mean by this term.

U.S. collectors tend to grade used stamps by the centering, while Europeans are far more likely to look at the cancellation when grading a stamp. To a European, "very fine used" stamps are those with neat cancels. Such stamps are prized, and are increasingly hard to find.

So if you send perfectly centered stamps with a smudged cancellation or a slogan or wavy lines streaking across it to European collectors of very fine stamps, they will not be pleased.

In this case, ignorance is definitely not bliss.

¿Whatzit? Response

A couple of comments on items sent in by Kenneth Johnson in the July-August CIRCUIT:

The Chinese stamp (item #2) is often found in older collections with an overprint in Chinese characters. I have always assumed it to be a revenue.

Belgium #454 with "T" stamped on it (item #4): Belgian regular issues were overprinted with a "T" handstamp when used to pay postage due during at least two distinct periods:

- (A) During World War I, as provisionals (hence presumably with approval of postal authorities). (Perhaps the same thing happened during World War II, but I have no information on that period.)
- (B) During the 1950s, as an "unauthorized" (although apparently tolerated) usage. Mr. Johnson's copy of Belgium #454 with "T" handstamp overprint is from this period, and hence is in this category. With the overprint, it is indeed an interesting postage due usage.

"Colis Postal" stamp (#5) is unfortunately illegible (totally black) on my copy of the CIRCUIT, and so is hard to assess. Doubtless Belgian parcel post. Perhaps the stamp was used to pay a supplementary charge of some kind; I have some unlisted Belgian "colis postal" stamps inscribed "majoration."

If I could see a really good copy of Bulgaria 186 (item #7), I might be able to suggest something.

Special Offer Announced

ne of the most popular aspects of the ISWSC is the Swap Circuit program. The Swap Circuit is a method of collecting and trading stamps without regard to the monetary value of the stamps being traded. Except for a low cost yearly fee, no money trades hands. The circuit manager compiles a packet of 100 stamps and selects up to five members to form a circuit. The packet of stamps and the names and addresses of the circuit members are then sent to the first member on the list. Within 5-7 days, the first member removes the stamps he/she wants to keep, replaces them with an equal number and quality of stamps, and mails the packet to the next name on the circuit. The process is repeated by each member on the list. The last person on the list sends the packet back to the circuit manager, along with 33 cents in mint US postage or an International Reply Coupon (IRC). The names on the circuit are then reordered, a new packet of stamps is created, and it is sent to the new first name on the list. Once each participant has been in each position on the list, a new circuit is formed with different members.

There are currently three types of circuits: Regular circuits, Cancelled To Order (CTO) circuits, and Small circuits. Regular circuits are for large stamps, excluding CTO's and small stamps. Members wishing to participate

in Regular circuits are divided according to the first letter of their last name: A-F, G-M, and N-Z. The CTO circuit is comprised of only CTO stamps. The Small circuit is comprised of stamps smaller than 1" x 1 1/8", which normally are definitive stamps. CTO and Small stamps are prohibited from the Regular circuits, as are USA issues. Damaged stamps (i.e. creased, torn, thin, etc.) are not welcome in any circuit. Stamps in all circuits are off paper.

Normally, a \$2.00 fee plus 100 stamps per circuit requested is required to join the circuits. This yearly fee covers the cost of the program and provides stock from which circuit stamp packets are made. As a special year-end offer, the \$2.00 fee will be waived for new circuit members joining the program prior to December 2000. Please note that normal renewal fees (\$2.00 plus 100 stamps per circuit requested) will be due in January 2001.

- * Responding to miscellaneous correspondence
- * Providing feedback and suggestions to the Swap Circuit Coordinator

The Small Swap Circuit currently has 55 participants and requires approximately 12 hours per month to manage. Access to a computer with word processing software is beneficial, but not mandatory. (E-mail and spreadsheet or database software would also be helpful.) In lieu of a computer, a typewriter is required.

The Swap Circuit Coordinator provides support to the circuit managers. Operating expenses incurred by the manager are reimbursable. Circuit managers are also exempt from swap circuit fees.
