Plebiscitary Stamps on Polish Territory by Jan Szpyrka (#539), Regional Secretary

I am sure that many of you have these stamps in your collection but are not aware of their Polish connection or their full story (Figure 1). Check your stamps closely, as you may even own a rarity.

For this initial article, I have chosen the story of plebiscitary stamps. After more than a century of foreign domination, Poland regained its independence in 1918. Three different sections of land divided from Poland earlier were reunited with

the motherland; a portion of Germany in the west, Austria in the south and Russia in the east. Peoples in these sectors also created a mixing of cultures, with Poles, Germans, Russians, Ukrainians, Czechs and Slovaks intermixed. The Inter-Allied Commissions of Government and Plebiscite was established to govern these regions.

There were four litigious territories in Poland. The Commission had seats in Kwidzyn (Marienwerder), Olsztyn (Allenstein) in the north bordering Germany (Prussia), and in Opole (Oppeln) and Cieszyn (Teschen) on the southern borders of Germany and Czechoslovakia (Figure 2).

The Inter-Allied Commission in Kwidzyn was active in 1920 from February 18 to August 16, with a plebiscite vote taking place on July 11. Stamps bearing "Marienwerder" saw circulation here up until September 13. The people had voted to become a part of Poland.

The Olsztyn Commission was established also in 1920, from February 11 through August 8. Here, too, the people voted to become a part of Poland on a vote on July 11. This was the territory of "Allenstein".

Stamps from "Upper Silesia" were used in the southern section of Poland between Germany and Czechoslovakia. The territorial seat was in the city of Opole (Oppeln), with these stamps seeing use from February 12, 1920 through July 9, 1922 (Figure 3).

The plebiscite took place on March 20, 1921, resulting in a land split among Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia, which received a small sector. However this result was nullified after an ethnic Polish Silesian uprising later that year, with Poland receiving the major portion of land on October 20. The

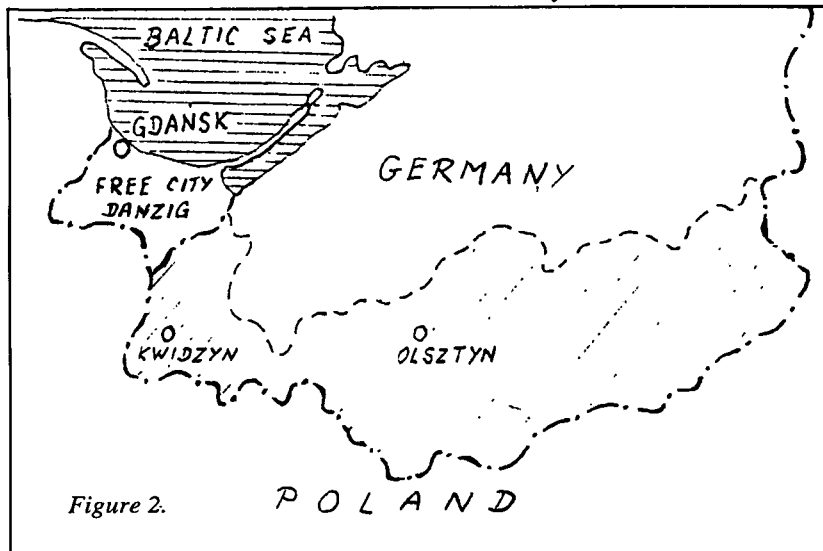
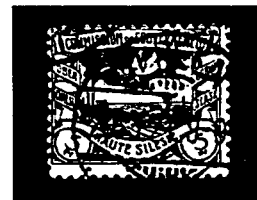

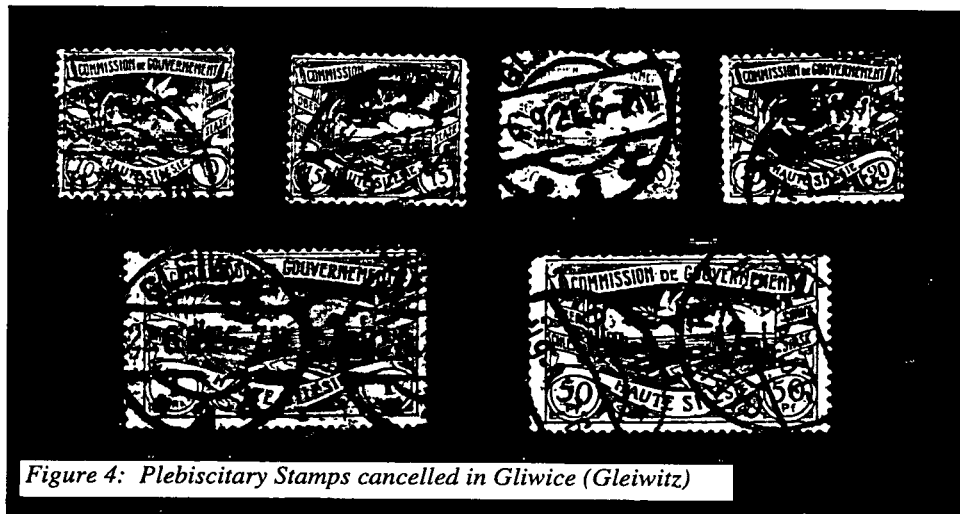


Figure 4: Plebiscitary Stamps cancelled in Gliwice (Gleiwitz)

plebiscite stamps remained valid on Polish soil until June 17, 1922 and on the German annexed land until they were sold out. I currently live in Gliwice (Gleiwitz), which was originally given to Germany after the vote and reverted to Poland after the uprising (Figure 4). Only the Czech sector did not convert to Polish lands.

The last plebiscite areas were in Eastern Silesia, Spisz and Orawa. See your catalog under Eastern Silesia for these stamps. Czechoslovakian and Polish stamps overprinted "S.O. 1920", for Silesie Orientale, were used later after a vote on July 28, 1920 divided the territory between the two countries along the Olza (Zaolzie) River.

In October 1938 Poland annexed by force the lands granted to Czechoslovakia under the 1920 arrangement. Germany also took advantage of Czech weakness as it, too, took control of lands it renamed "Bohemia and Moravia". The city of Orlowa produced a Polish local overprint bearing a "T" or "Tkc" in October 1938 which is not listed in most major catalogs. The "T" stands for the newly restored Polish Teschen area, the land ceded by Czechoslovakia. Poland celebrated the restoration of this territory on a stamp issued on November 11, 1938 (Scott #334, Gibbons #349).

Now the border between Poland and the Czech Republic is again the Olza River. The city of Cieszyn (Teschen) is half in Poland and half in the Czech Republic. Slovakia contains some of the lands once known as Orawa and Spisz in the 1920's (Figure 5). ••

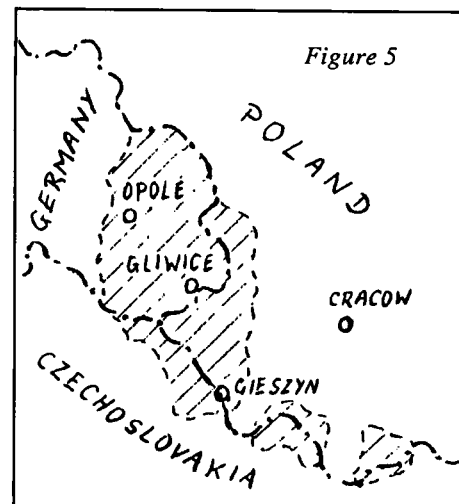

Latest ISWSC Board of Directors Vote

The following actions have been approved by the ISWSC Board in a vote held in late March. These actions broaden the appeal of the Society and prepare us for the future.

1. The ISWSC hereby appoints Dave Creson (#170) as its Retention Manager.

Dave has volunteered to work with the Secretary in tracking down delinquent members and follow up with members who have resigned to find out why and if they can be encouraged to rejoin.

2. A family membership is to be offered for \$15 per household, covering up to four (4) people.

Philately often is a "family affair" and this is meant to encourage such memberships. Only one copy of *The Circuit* will be sent to such members, who otherwise will be entitled to the full benefits of membership except for voting, when they will be able to cast only one vote.

3. A stamp club membership is to be offered at the regular member rate.

We have had numerous requests from clubs to join as an entity. This can be done if one member acts as the liaison and is held responsible for the group as a whole. They will be entitled to 1 vote during an election.

4. The ISWSC is to create an "association" classification for

interested stamp clubs.

Stamp clubs retaining a minimum of 5 ISWSC members can apply for association status. Such a club will receive a free issue of *The Circuit* for their club library and be eligible to receive sales circuits, swap circuits and Omni books. A current ISWSC member will act as a liaison between the society and the association. Associations will be offered at no charge. An association will be deemed inactivated if fewer than 5 current ISWSC members remain in the club. They will have no voting rights.

Direct any inquiries on these points to President Tom Fortunato. ••

Beginner's Column by Al and Mildred Feinberg (#361)

A good idea for the beginner is to start some sort of a special collection in order to diversify from routine worldwide collecting. What it does is, it gives us a more in depth idea of what collecting stamps is all about. Some speciality collections consist of collecting airplanes, boats, trains, animals or themes, etc.

Today I want to talk about another type of special collection. Great Britain Scott # 33 is a stamp in particular that I will use as a subject. In the upper left and right corner of this stamp is an alphabetical letter. By properly arranging these letters it is possible to create a complete sheet of stamps with each stamp in its proper place.

#1-"A" stamp with "A" in the left corner and "A" in the right corner would mean first row, first stamp.

#2-"A" left, "B" right would

indicate first row, second stamp.

#3-"A" left, "C" right, first row, third stamp, etc.

#4-"B" left, "A" right would be second row, first stamp.

#5-"B" left, "B" right would be second row, second stamp.

#6-"C" left, "D" right would be third row, fourth stamp, etc.

The Scott # 33 is an inexpensive stamp in most cases. Used copies can sometimes be bought for pennies. Condition of the stamp really doesn't matter. At times it's possible to buy this stamp in quantity but poor quality at a reasonable price.

When you first start your sheet it will be easy but as the sheet fills up, trying to find those you still need is the challenge. Completing the sheet gives great pleasure and satisfaction.

Lots of luck and have fun. ••

your efforts (most often far less than you spend to send the letters) you will be in BIG trouble with USPS. It is a Federal offense to use the mail fraudulently, and this scam qualifies. The second chain letter is one where stamps are sent, instead of money. While this chain is also illegal, it has been going for several years. When I was newly returned to stamp collecting and unaware this kind of letter was also considered a chain letter I sent out the required stamps and mailed out 10 letters. I'm still waiting for the first stamps to arrive! Since it appears someone is using the ISWSC mailing list, you may receive one of the first type of chain letter. Please turn it over to the postal authorities, or ask your Postmaster to do so. If you want to take your chances with the stamp chain, do so at your own risk, but remember it, too, is illegal.

The low priority of bulk mailings has flooded this office with requests for "lost" newsletters. The usual mailing schedule has each issue at the Post Office near the first of the second month on the masthead. Thus, the May-June issue will be mailed between first and 15th of May. Delivery dates are extremely erratic - ranging from one week to as long as 8 weeks. While an 8-week delay is unusual; it seems to happen to a few members (often in different parts of the US each mailing) every issue. It is not unusual for members in Great Britain to get their newsletter before US members. When a US member receives a letter from a European member mentioning receipt of *The Circuit* before their own arrives, it seems that most members assume that their copy must have gone astray - when, in fact, it may be sitting in the back of some Post Office waiting for a slow delivery day. (Editor's Note: Bulk rate rules allow it to sit up to three days at each stop, but is supposed to be delivered at the earliest available date. So if you are continually having problems with late mail, complain to your Postmaster. He may not be aware that your carrier is not fulfilling duties in a timely manner. When all else fails, write to the Postmaster

Punching puts a great deal of pressure on a stack of pages so the ink must be completely dry before punching to prevent ink offset on other pages. It also would raise the cost of the newsletter¹ and ISWSC can barely afford what we are doing now on the low dues. Any member can obtain a 3-hole punch at an office supply store for about \$15 and punch your own copy easily and rapidly. ••

Note that the holes can't be faked by cutting away the regular perfs, as the size of an elliptical hole doesn't equal an exact number of perfs. ••
