

Endangered Species of Zimbabwe

he Convention and International Trade in Endangered Species of Flora and Fauna (CITES) was established in July 1975, with 134 member countries currently belonging. A conference is held every two years to monitor and implement policies dealt with by various committees. From the 9th to the 20th of June 1997, the 10th meeting of CITES was held in Zimbabwe. CITES works by regulating or banning trade in species that they have placed on three lists.

Appendix I lists animals and plants whose figures have dropped near or below the accepted optimum level, making extinction near and imminent. All commercial International Trade is prohibited. Species selected from this category are portrayed in this stamp issue. Appendices II and III permit controlled Commercial Trade. The CITES meeting covered several contentious issues, including the de-listing of the Zimbabwean Elephants to Appendix II. The Africa Resources Trust, Campfire Association and other interest groups in Zimbabwe, in conjunction with the Department of National Parks and Wildlife Management, have worked to change the management policies, which are a major part of tourism, commerce and the economy of Zimbabwe. At the end of the conference Zimbabwe succeeded in the lobby for the de-listing of her elephants to Appendix II. This special issue of stamps, which was issued on April 15, 1997, was researched, designed and painted by Zimbabwean artist Paula Ware.

Cycad (Cycadeceae Encephalartos manikensis)

The manikensis complex of species is specific to the

Zimbabwean area. This primitive plant is said to be a relic from the dinosaur age, and much prized by collectors around the world. Cycads are long-lived, perennial, unisexed plants that

develop cones and produce seeds. Reproduction may occur only once every 15 years in some species, and the male and female plants produce cones at the same time for fertilization. (Fig. 1)

Peregrine Falcon (Falco Peregrinus minor)

The diminishing numbers of this bird prompted a captive breeding program in 1978 by the Zimbabwean Falconers' Club. The habitat hunting terrain requirements have changed by encroaching development and pollutants in

agriculture. One female bird can eat as many as 3,000 quelea birds in a year. The accumulated toxins cause sterility and often death, placing the species in jeopardy. (Fig. 2)

Pangolin (Manis temmincki)

A shy, nocturnal animal that has been placed on the Specially Protected Species List because of its association with traditional and cultural beliefs, the pangolin is often

ISWSC President's Column

t's time to get back to business! Consider this a "State of the Society" message. Although we have now just enrolled new member #2228; the ISWSC currently has 709 active members. This represents a loss of a little over 100 members per year from about three years ago, when we had over a thousand members. The reasons for the attrition are many and include age, ill health, discontinuation of collecting, and conflicting time demands as major reasons cited. Not a single member has ever resigned due to dissatisfaction or negative feelings toward the Society, but then not every resigning member states a reason.

Another problem is the dwindling number of young members of the ISWSC. Currently we have only 10 such members and we are not getting many inquiries from young people interested in joining. I am hopeful that our newly elected VP for Charitable Services, Jeff Hayward, will be working towards increasing our youth membership.

The ISWSC. Board members, officers and managers have been holding an email discussion of this problem and have decided that a two-pronged approach is needed. The first is an effort at retention including reminders to members who are close to their expiration dates, listing such members in each issue of *The Circuit*, incentives for renewing early, and other similar efforts. The second is a recruitment effort to enroll new members. This could include advertising, bonuses for member recruiting new members, letter writing campaigns to philatelic

killed and presented to chiefs, leaders and spirit mediums. The animal has a long tail and heavy brown scales. The long claws on the front feet tear into ant colonies, where it probes with a meter-long tongue to lap up ants. (Fig. 3)

Black Rhinoceros (Diceros binorcis)

Trade in rhino horns, specifically for use in ceremonial dagger-handles and traditional medicines, has brought the rhino to near-extinction in Africa. The Zimbabwe population declined from 1700 in

1989 to 300 in 1993, prompting the initiation of protection zones, fitting of radio collars and dehorning. Numbers have risen by 20 in the last 2-3 years as a result of a successful but very expensive anti-poaching exercise. (**Fig. 4**)

Elephant (Loxodonta africana)

This tusk-bearing animal is the world's largest living land mammal. Over-hunting and grazing restrictions have reduced the African population drastically. Zimbabwe had fewer than 500 in 1920, but with effective conservation their numbers have soared to over 30,000 more than the optimum sustainable number level of about 35,000. Before the CITES conference this was causing problems, as Zimbabwe

was bound by the CITES laws. One of the problems Zimbabwe faced was how to effectively manage wildlife with regard to elephants. The most important result of the con-

ference for Zimbabwe was the de-listing of the elephant from Appendix I to Appendix II. (Fig. 5)

Python (Python sebae)

The skin of this reptile is highly sought after as a fine and decorated leather. An adult may reach up to six meters, and newly hatched snakes average

60cm in length. This causes fear, contributing to its threatened extermination. This species of snake is seldom aggressive and is an asset in controlling noxious rodents such as the cane rats. Captive breeding has been successful. (Fig. 6)

o remove self-sticking stamps from paper, especially if the self-sticking adhesive is not water soluble, apply a few drops of Ronsonol Lighter Fluid to the back of the paper. The stamp will then come off easily.

Escessive adhesive can be removed from the back of the stamp with a tissue moistened with lighter fluid.

Getting Kids Interested in Collecting

recently had a chance to get down to West Palm Beach for a couple of weeks, where three of my daughters have taken up residence, to visit the grandkids. Kyla is a bit over two years of age and much too young to be introduced to stamping, right? At least that's the conventional wisdom.

Well I must have given her an old commonwealth album one night some time ago when she was living here with us, to entertain her and thought nothing of it.

However while I was in South Florida visiting, I had gone to a stamp show in Miami and bought a few items, which on my return to my daughter's house I spread over the kitchen table. Over to my side came Kyla with the album that she had kept somewhere and she wanted some stamps for her book. Since she is so young I know she can't handle hinges or soaking stamps but I then got a bright idea.

My daughters had saved me an assortment of stamps from their X-mas mail so I trimmed the paper square and using some glue stick put them in Kyla's book.

After watching me for a few minutes she figured out how to put the stickum on the back and she began trying to place several in the book. Something else came up before it got too repetitive and boring and her book with it's eight or ten stamps got put away.

Each day for the rest of my visit, whenever I did anything with my stamps, she would bring me her book and we put five or ten items in the album. It did not seem to matter that many were slightly nicked by the mail process or that there were a lot of reindeer, flags or X-mas Madonnas, she was just happy with her book of stamps. I did not mention that many were upside down or sideways, as it did

not seem to be important to her.

Some day should she have an interest in stamping the album can be opened up and the stamps within soaked off the pages and the cut square paper. And if she never builds an interest nothing is lost but a few extremely common items anyway. It was hard to figure how much of an impression I made with her at that time.

However, a few days later I overheard a conversation from another room. Apparently her younger cousin (1½) had the temerity to try to pickup her album. I heard Kyla saying...."NO, Erik... that's MY stamps....Grampa gave them to me!"

Since returning to my home I've sent her an envelope each week with various cheap stamps in it; her mother says that she sits still and patiently sticks them in the album.

The more I think about it the more I am coming to the conclusion that our efforts to attract young collectors may be too late. By the time youngsters develop the motor skills to handle stamps right (hinges and all) it is too late, as they have been hooked by the instant gratification activities of the Sega Games, MTV and such. By then we have to compete with too many blaring attention-getters, but if we start earlier perhaps the seed can be sown in their fertile minds and someday in the future they will begin to become more involved in collecting the "right" way.

I had once, a few years ago, watched one of the youth advisors from our local club try to keep a bunch of elementary school age children under control while he showed them the right way to handle mint stamps with a set of tongs. I had been invited to show some of my treasures and talk a little bit about collecting. I was

struck at the time how boring and structured he had made the whole process seem, but did not at that time think it through.

I would venture to guess that a large number of our members are grandparents and, as such, we are in a position to influence the children's behavior. I would also guess that many of us are waiting for the right moment to get some spark of interest from our grandchildren when they are old enough to appreciate our hobby. But I think now that the best course of action might be to give them some stamps as soon as they are old enough to stick them in a book. Never mind the hinges and not touching the stamps with the fingers. Get them involved with the idea of collecting sooner, not later.

I have picked out another old discarded album to give to Erik next year and a bunch of simple stamps to go with them. I have several grandkids to experiment on so I plan to give each of them in turn an old book that if they lose or ruin will be no loss. I will send each one a few stamps at a time and a small glue stick.

I think I shall have to keep some notes to see the results of my experiment.

I am beginning to have this fantasy that starts some years in the future with some child saying to his or her children, "My grampa gave me those stamps".

Jan./Feb. ¿Whatzits? Inspires Many Answers!

uenter Rathgeb (#1539) of Germany emailed the editor with the following message: "I can tell you something about the stamps in the dWhatzits? column.

R.A.S.D. Sahara Occ. means Arabic Democratic Republic of Sahara; Sahara Occ. means Western Sahara. It was formerly the Spanish colony named Spanish Sahara. In 1975, when the last African colonies were de-colonized, especially the Portuguese colonies, there happened the Green march of hundredthousands of people from Morocco. Morocco thought that this territory was a historical part of the Moroccan kingdom. The people marched into the territory and the Spanish did not fight against it. They gave up rule over their territory within a few days. The northern part of the colony was occupied by Morocco and the southern part by Mauretania. Later, Morocco overtook the whole territory. The territory is rich in minerals. There is a freedom-fighting group of the people of Sahauris (the whole people is only about 100.000) which fights for independence. They have an exilegovernment that is not recognized by the international society. They print their own stamps, which are not at all in use. The themes are partly the country, but mostly sports, animals, flowers. I hope this is some information that may help."

And this from **Pierce Bullen** (#2124): "Stamps sent in by **Lynda Bray** pictured on p. 9 of Jan-Feb "Circuit" are phantoms "issued" by the exile "government" of the Western Sahara, which has its headquarters in exile in Algeria.

"Western Sahara is former Spanish Sahara, and was taken over by Morocco (and initially partly by Mauritania) after the Spanish withdrew in 1976. The local independence movement, named Polisario, formed a government-in-exile called the Sahrawi Arab Democratic Republic. The initials "R.A.S.D." on the stamps are the Spanish-language initials of the said Republic. The Arabic writing on the stamps consists mainly of the initials of the Arabic name of the exile government (al-H al-'A as-S ad-D); the full name of the government is "al-Hukumah al-'Arabiyah as-Sahrawiya ad-Dimukratiyah." There is an outline map of the Western Sahara on the background of the first stamp in the second row in the "Circuit" article.

"The cancellations shown are presumably all CTOs. However, since the Sahrawi government-in-exile is recognized by most Arab states and a few other countries, it is possible that some stamps franked with Sahrawi stamps may have passed through the mails within or from Algeria."

From Randy Smith (#1111): "I read with interest

the Whatzits column from the Jan-Feb 2000 The Circuit newsletter asking for help with identifying stamps from "R.A.S.D. Sahara Occ.". Remembering that I also had some stamps with those markings (and that I had not yet truly identified them), I decided now was the time to try to find out their origin.

"My first attempts to identify the stamps involved looking up "R.A.S.D" and "Sahara Occ." in several stamp identifiers I own. "R.A.S.D." didn't yield anything, but "Sahara Occidental" was listed as being Spanish Sahara, and "Sahara Occidental La Aguera" was listed as being Aguera (La). Not fully trusting either, I next turned to Linn's World Stamp Almanac to try to find additional information about each country. Aguera was described as a district in the western Sahara, which issued its own stamps until 1924 when it became part of Spanish Sahara. Looking under Spanish Sahara, I learned that it was a former Spanish possession in north-western Africa and was comprised of Cape Juby, La Aguera, and Rio de Oro. It also credited Spanish Sahara with issuing over 300 stamps, but it also indicated it had been inactive since 1976. Although additional information was given (including mentioning POLISARIO, a nationalist group which declared the area independent), none of it explained the stamps illustrated in the newsletter.

"Giving up on the traditional resources I had, I decided to turn to the Internet. Remembering that many stamp identifiers don't list countries whose actual names appear on stamps, I decided to start by searching on "R.A.S.D." and "Sahara Occ". A quick search for "R.A.S.D." using a popular search engine didn't turn up any related information, but searching for "Sahara Occ" struck pay dirt. Following the links to several sights, I was able to put things together, identify the stamps, and learn some history and current events at the same time. In the words of Paul Harvey, here's "the rest of the story".
