nterests, and we are reprinting their letters here. Here's a chance to see how your fellow members collect, and maybe get some new ideas for yourself. I'm going to lead off the pack with my own collection.

#### THE EDITORS COLLECTION

I started this with the idea of describing my collection, but I find that will be almost impossible. From this swivel chair in front of my computer, I can see two fancy albums with plastic stock sheets. That's my Pacific area collection. Next to them are six other loose leaf albums in various stages of wear and bulge. That's the rest of the world. Except.

Except for the one labeled "K-Q", which is open to "Mexico" on the other desk. Except for the 8" of stock pages on the desk waiting to be filed between "Mid Congo" and "Norway". Except for the 12" stack of stock pages and the two shoe boxes under the desk covering the last part of the alphabet.

Of course, there's the box of everything labeled "Countries already gone past". Then there's the plastic bin of envelopes and corners to be soaked. Another one full of covers. Couple of cigar boxes of covers, too. Someday, I'll have to sell the boxes. They're probably worth more than the stamps.

There's another plastic bin over there, too. My nice new stamps from Australia and New Zealand and Papua. And literature. And ten file boxes with stamps in plassines.

That's about it. Except - downstairs, in plastic bags, are the remains of more pounds of kiloware than I care to remember buying. There are probably a few down inside-my chair in the living room, too. They hardly count. I just moved into this room, so there isn't a fortune down behind the desk yet. Let's see, there may be a couple of sheets on the floor, in that pile over there....

I use quadrille lined pages and am not the neatest mounter in town. Of course, I use a computer for my inventory. (Apple //+, 48k, File Cabinet and List Handler). But why do I collect all of this, instead of one neat specialty?

I've tried not to. But, in acquiring material dealing with the South Pacific (my favorite area), I couldn't decide where to stop. Was Japan, or Laos, or Sri Lanka in the area? And what do I do with the Malta stamps in the lot I bid on at the club auction. All I really wanted was the Australian covers somebody tossed in as an afterthought. I guess I collect worldwide because it's easier for me to decide what I don't want to collect than decide what I do!

#### DICK EDWARDS

Hint for Scott's International Album users: You can relieve those complaints about thin coverage in 1840 to 1940. Scour dealers and stamp shows for old Scotts Specialty albums. Look for those where supplements stopped 10 or 20 years ago.

Get a large paper cutter and 3 hole punch. Using an International blank page for a pattern, cut and punch to fit, replace the International pages for the same years. May need more or larger binders.

I think the idea of a group of collectors, bound by a common interest, namely worldwide stamps, is intriguing. Much more fascinating is the thought that the group could also be composed of people who live around the world. What better way of participating in a hobby that is said to be the largest of all hobbies?

Let me tell you of my observations and collection.

I started collecting through a neighbor who gave me a birthday gift, "My First Stamp Colleting Kit". This neighbor didn't know the first thing about collecting, so at seven years old I latched onto the hobby with much enthusiam, but I was on my own. In the kit I had everything I needed - an album, stamps, hinges, an identifier, magnifying glass, etc.

Many hours were spent with the stamps. Of course, the ones with glue on the back were promptly licked and stuck to the album page. What else was glue for?

From that start in 1950 to the sixties, my collection expanded through packets purchased at the drug store and approvals from various countries. I was still collecting on my own, and anything learned came from trial and error (mostly error). My collection expanded to the Minkus Master Global and the U.S. All American Albums. Now, I was specializing in mint U.S. - what else?

My first catalogs were the last ones Scott issued in hard cover. There was so much information in those two books, I read and reread them for hours. That was also the time I discovered organized philately.

I didn't know of any local clubs, but I learned of the American First Day Cover Society through a newspaper article and joined them. I collected FDCs for several years, until I realized they were really only souveniers, and didn't serve a legitimate postal function. I still collect them as beautiful examples of engraved art, but I no longer belong to the AFDCS.

Today, my Master Global album has grown to eight volumes, as I have purchased every supplement since 1952. I collect new issues from six countries and one topic, all mint, as well as FDCs from the U.S. and several other countries. And, of course, I collect world wide, so here I am back in organized philately with WMCC.

I didn't want to jump headlong into a large organization like the APS, and I thought our group would be a good choice. I like the idea of donating stamps to encourage the hobby, and the dues are reasonable.

I did imagine that I would be flooded with offers of trades as soon as I joined, but there has only been one person to person swap offered. I have heard from a number of circuits, too.

I like to trade one for one, not on catalog basis. I buy a set of catalogs about every six years, as I simply cannot afford the cost of a new set every year. What a mess it must be, sorting through values each year when the catalogs change!

As I said, I've only received one offer to trade. I'm guilty, too, for I haven't sent out one request, either. But, who do you send to, and what do you say? If there are any others out there who feel like I do, drop me a line. I promise to answer each one. And, don't be surprised if you hear from me in the near future.

I am 55 years old and have been a collector since age 10. I collect the world, 1840-1940. I may stretch it over a little when a particular set has some stamps issued later.

Naturally, I also accumulate a lot of later material so I always have a good stock to trade or sell. Terminating my collection at 1940 makes it more manageable to collect the world and also eliminates all of the wallpaper of the last forty years. Mint or used, with or without gum, makes no difference. I collect for my enjoyment and not for the value of my estate.

I use Scott International and just buy the blank pages and fill them up. I buy mainly collections, lots and accumulations from dealers or individuals.

I am U.S. Navy, retired, and spend as much time as I can afford running around the country and the world. I have never grown tired of travel, so if some of the members get a phone call some day, it is just me in the neighborhood, making a social call to talk stamps or trade or whatever.

Stamp collecting has given me so much... pleasure, knowledge, even peace of mind and escape when my first husband was dying. And finally, I was so glad to learn about the Worldwide Collectors' Club. I do have some other collections, but... I just can't resist a stamp!

I thought you might be interested in the housing of my collection. After the slim Scott album, I graduated to a loose-leaf one. I think a Harris. and then, for many years, used blank pages so I had room for all the watermark varieties, etc. Finally, I got the Minkus Global. the world in one volume. It has now grown to 16 volumes with 4 empty binders in the wings. This year, when the supplement comes out, I think at least 2 of those will go into service.

Well, back to the CTOs.. Sinatra recordings.. and letting my mind wander.. stamp collecting can be so relaxing....


