



Who's Who on Stamps of Latin America

earning about those portrayed on stamps has always been a part of collecting for me. Some years ago, I ran across a few booklets written or revised by Albert Kunze with titles Who's Who on the Postage Stamps of Argentina or Bolivia, Chile, Guatemala,



or other Latin American countries. They were published by the Pan American Union and had sequential booklet numbers. A booklet consists of 20-50 pages of short biographies, a timeline of the country's history, a foreword by the country's ambassador, and a page or two of black and

white images of stamps. The text is typewritten and the binding is stapled. The first booklet was for Argentina, published in 1940.

I kept looking for these booklets, not knowing how many there were. They are hard to find. Finally, I obtained some collateral documents that answered my questions. Letters to a collector from Albert Kunze indicate that Kunze worked in the Latin American Stamp Section of the Pan American Union (now part of the Organization of American States). In addition to these booklets, this section offered new stamp issues; flags, coats of arms and pictorial poster stamps; and booklets about individual countries, cities, and commodities.

Candidates, Volunteers Needed

s mentioned in the President's Report, the ISWSC is in need of a few good men and women to step forward to serve in various volunteer positions. The ISWSC was built on and continues to operate solely because of the time and effort given by its members. Please consider one of the opportunities listed below, then contact President Joanne Berkowitz (#98) or Immediate Past President Randy Smith (#1111) to express interest in a position or to get more information. (Please see page 2 for contact information.) For opportunities marked with an asterisk (*), those interested should contact Joanne or Randy immediately, as ballots must be quickly prepared for inclusion in the next newsletter.

ISWSC Vice President *

Candidates are needed for ISWSC Vice President, a position created by the bylaw revisions approved by the membership last year. The Vice President, along with the President and Executive Director, serves on the Executive Committee, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the ISWSC. The Vice President also serves on the Board of Directors, attending two-three Board meetings per year (via e-mail only). In the absence of the President, the Vice President chairs meetings of the Board. Should the President resign or become incapable of serving, the Vice President becomes the President. The initial term of office for the position is one year (January—December 2009). The position is estimated to take 5-10 hours per month.

ISWSC At-Large Director (2) *

Two At-Large Directors will be elected to two-year terms on the ISWSC Board of Directors. (Additional Directors may be appointed at the Board's discretion.) At-Large Directors attend Board meetings (held 2-3 times per year via e-mail) and provide input and suggestions concerning all matters discussed by the Board. At-Large Directors may also be asked to lead specific projects as determined by the President.

Swap Circuit Manager

A volunteer is needed to manage half of the Small/Definitive swap circuit. Managers receive stamp stock and member roster information from the Swap Circuit Coordinator. Managers are responsible for creating routing sheets and stamp packets for each circuit, responding to member's inquiries, communicating with and escalating any concerns to the Swap Circuit Coordinator. Access to a computer, printer, and e-mail are highly desirable. The position is estimated to take 10-20 hours per month. Due to the cost of postage and the location of the majority of the ISWSC membership, those interested in the position should live in the USA or Canada.

Grab Bag Program Coordinator

A volunteer is needed to manage the 2009 Grab Bag program, a unique swapping opportunity traditionally held early each year. The manager is responsible for receiving packets of 100 used Large, Small, and/or CTO stamps from members wishing to participate in the program. The manager then mails back an equal other participant's packets from number submissions. Last year, a total of 19 members participated, with most submitting one or two swap packets. A total of 59 submissions were made. It is estimated the position will require a total of 20 hours from January—March.

2008 Election Chair *

One volunteer (who is not running for an elected position) is need for a short-term assignment as 2008 Election Chair. The Election Chair will have their name and address printed on the ballots, then will receive mailed ballots (between November and January). The Election Chair is responsible for tallying the ballots received, reporting the final results to the ISWSC Board, then forwarding all of the ballots to a designated Board member. The position is estimated to take a total of 5-10 hours over 2-3 months.

sent away for two ounces: one of Switzerland and one of Slovakia. I enclosed four \$1 bills in payment.

The return envelope was postmarked five days after I posted the request, a fast turnaround. There was a note enclosed that the Slovakia was out of stock. Instead of refunding my money, however, Ms. Jones included a \$2 store credit voucher on a Post-It note. I would have preferred my \$2 to be returned. However,


she did go an extra mile and return the stamps I had used to send the request, which included a nice commemorative. She had no obligation to do this, and actually had motive not to, as she sells (as seen in her ad) U.S. mixtures. She used nice, current commemoratives

on the outgoing envelope and had them neatly and lightly hand-canceled.

The mixture, heavy on recent issues, contained 96 sound stamps and 6 faulty stamps. This works out to 6.25% faulty, which is higher than I would have liked. The faulty will not be considered in the rest of this column.

Though on single paper, the yield per ounce was somewhat low due to many of the stamps being on postcard-thickness stock or greater.

Counting only face-different stamps, there were 62 unique stamps. This was mostly due to heavy duplication in two issues, Scott 1168 and 1170, both commemoratives from 2003, which each had 11 copies in the mixture.




One complete set of stamps, Scott 772-776, bore first-day cancellations and were clearly cut from a first-day cover. I don't know why this was done. The block, pictured above, is valued at \$3.75 for the used stamps.

The total value of the stamps is \$47.15; face-different, \$32.50. 23 stamps, or 24%, are valued at the minimum Scott value of \$0.20. If those are removed from calculations, the face-different stamps total \$28.30. The average stamp in this mixture cost \$0.02 and had a catalog value of \$0.49. This is an impressive cost-to-value ratio. Considering only face-different stamps, each stamp cost \$0.06. The most valuable stamps, 225 and B698, are both valued in Scott at \$2.10.

Two items of further interest were included: a Frama label (picture below) identified in the Michel

Automatenmarken-Spezial-Katalog as Switzerland #5, valued in the 2004 edition at 1.50 euros, and a lone Machin Head stamp from Great Britain that somehow found its way in. Scott identifies it as MH129, but for the sake



of being thorough, I believe it to be DG 250.1.1b under the Deegam Machins catalogue.


The Frama label was included in the count of stamps but its value was not incorporated, due to difficulties with catalog pricing policies, editions and exchange rates.

Although duplication was high on some issues, receiving approximately \$30 of collectible stamps for a

Whatzit? Members Respond

his is the best Whatzit? column that I have had the pleasure to submit as it is a synopsis of the information submitted by members. I received an e-mail from a member concerning the main text of the Whatzit? column in the July/August issue of *The Circuit*, and I am passing it along:

In Figure 1, the inscription in the upper left appears to say "Palestine Resistance" like the English/French inscription.

Figure 2 indeed appears to be inscribed "al -Jabha ash-sha'biyya li-Tahrir Falastin" (Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine). The denomination (50 fils) is apparently in Jordanian currency, although Iraqi currency would be the same. The inscription in the lower right, as reproduced, is too hazy to read.

Figure 3 reads "Kuwait" at the top. The bottom inscription reads "For the Benefit of the Fedayeen Effort" (li-Salih al-9amal al-Fida'i). The inscription at the left side is in fancy script which makes it hard to read at this resolution.

The top of Figure 4 reads "Front for the Palestinian Popular Struggle" (Jabhat an-Nidal ash-Sha'bi al-Falastini). That suggests the English letters "P.P.S.F" may stand for "Palestinian Popular Struggle Front."

Figure 5, the top line, appears to say "The Workers of Palestine and the Leadership of the Revolution and its



Defenders" ('ummal Falastin wa Qud ath-Thawra wa Hamatiha). The inscription around the central device is too small to read at this resolution, but the sword-like element inside the innermost ring is a map of Palestine. The denomination is in fils (Jordan or Iraq).

Whatzits. Back in the May/June column, Figure 5 is a local post stamp from the city of Przedborz, Poland. This city is in the district of Konsk, in the region of Radom. In 1918, the city had a population of 6,000 people. The Austrian military post provided a mail service only for military mail; the nearest civilian post was in Konsk. The Austrians therefore permitted the

establishment of local delivery service for civilian mail. This stamp is part of one of three sets of four stamps each; the sets are similar in design, but different. Michel lists these stamps as #17. Przedborz stamps (and other

Polish 1915-18 locals) are listed in the Michel catalogue for Eastern Europe, after the rest of the country, under "Local Issues" (lokalausgaben) and also in "Poland 1918 Locals," published by J. Barefoot, 1999.

The words on the stamp mean "municipal council" (Rada Mieska) and "Przedborz municipality" (Miasta Przedborza). The denomination in hazerzy is a clue that Przedbororz is in Austro-Hungarian occupied Poland. Prior to World War I, Przedbororz was part of Russian-occupied Poland.

Stamps were issued by various Polish cities before the end of the war to ensure local mail service. Warsaw was the leader with issues in 1915-16, some other cities followed in 1916. Right after the war's end (November 1918-January 1919), postmasters in many cities issued overprints on German, German Occupation (General Gouvernement), and Austrian stamps. Przedborz, which started its issues in December 1917, was one of three cities to issue newly-printed stamps during this period.

Fakes of all the Przedborz stamps, and many of the other cities' issues, were marketed, the most notable fakes being the stamps of Zarki and Przedborz. (I have been assured this stamp is genuine.)

Also in the May/June issue, the Figure 4 Whatzit was tentatively identified as a fantasy pretending to be from Bulgaria.

Returning to the July/August issue, I received the following information on the Whatzit stamps:

Figure 7 is a stamp issued by the "Stockholms Stadspost," a local post operating in Stockholm, Sweden, started in December 1887 by SA. Jeruliong. The local post

was later purchased by the Swedish Post Office and ceased all operations in October 1889. This stamp is the first of a six stamp set issued in December 1887 and depicts St. Erik. The example shown was remaindered by the Roman numeral five (V). It is listed in Rowcroft's Catalogue of Local Post Issues.

Figure 8 is a municipal revenue stamp issued by the city of St Petersburg, Russia in 1865. It is listed under the heading of "Police Urbaine" in the Forbin Revenue Catalogue. I am not sure exactly how they were used, possibly for payment of some sort of permit issued by the police, such as a residency permit.

Figure 9 is an essay showing King Amadeo of Spain. He was an Italian Duke who was elected King of Spain in 1870 and ruled until he abdicated in disgust on February 11, 1873, returning to Italy and proclaiming the Spanish people to be ungovernable. This essay may be from either Spain or Puerto Rico and was probably issued in 1873. Stamps of this design were issued in Spain and the colonies, including Puerto Rico, Cuba and the Philippines. This example was also remaindered with obliterator bars. They came in 20 different colors.

It has been pointed out that reading the Whatzit answers without accompanying illustrations is not ideal. Unfortunately, space considerations preclude

The Pan American Union, at the time of publication, consisted of 21 countries: the United States plus 20 Latin American countries. An enclosure

indicates that the plan was to publish a booklet for each of 20 of these countries (presumably all but the U.S.). Clearly they were being numbered, although not always published, in alphabetical order. Twelve booklets were produced, through Haiti. I can find no indication in any library or bookstore that any others were produced. Number 11

was for Guatemala, published in 1955, and number 12 was for Haiti, published in 1949.

These booklets provide information on people not readily available in standard references and explain some interesting facts:

- How someone with the name O'Higgins came to be the national hero of Chile.
- What was the 1735 Geodesical Expedition to Quito, honored by Ecuador with a stamp series in 1936?

- How Padre Francisco Bellini of the Dominican Republic became involved in the controversy over the burial of Columbus' remains.
- Why Grover Cleveland was honored on a Brazilian stamp.

Here's the story of the 1735 Expedition: The French

Academy sent expeditions to several parts of the world to determine the exact shape of the earth. In particular, there were competing theories as to whether the earth was pointed or flat at the poles. The sixteen men sent to the Quito territory of Peru (Ecuador did not yet exist) included astronomer Louis Godin, geographer Charles

Marie de la Condamine and physicist Pierre Bouger. Although Godin was appointed head, the strong personality of Condamine caused his name to be attached to the expedition as indicated on the stamp. The Quito region was chosen as the most favorable land lying along the equator. The expedition was a success, providing measurements of numerous types over several years.
