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# Whatzit: Danube Steam Navigation Company

he Donau-Dampfschiffahrts-Gesellschaft, initials D.D.S.G., was formed in 1830. Envision the world at this time. There are no motorized vehicles, no metalled roads and no airplanes. Trains are very primitive. The most efficient, most comfortable and safest means of transportation is by



boat. The Danube, one of the great navigable rivers of the world, provides access to the Austro-Hungarian Empire and the Sultanate of Turkey. It will, in the future, connect the new countries of Romania and Bulgaria while continuing to provide access

to the Black Sea with its connection to the rest of the world. By 1880, D.D.S.G. was the largest international shipping company in the world.

In 1846, D.D.S.G. became an official carrier of mail for the Austrian Post Office. With such a provenance, I am surprised that Scott does not list the stamps of

D.D.S.G. because they are officially used as postage for mail both within the Empire and internationally, even though issued by a private company.

The first stamps were printed in 1866—a red 17kr stamp was issued. Because that

year 10kr became the official rate for a first class letter of the Austrian Post, the D.D.S.G. produced a lilac 10kr stamp (Figure 1; source *American Philatelist*, May 1950, pg 611). A green 10kr was issued in 1869 and, in 1870, a red 10kr.

I bid for a selection of D.D.S.G. stamps offered in an auction with a one line description. When I received these stamps, I did not have any of the four stamps I was familiar with from reading philatelic literature. The

American Philatelist series of articles on the D.D.S.G. published in the 1950's were no help. The note by Peter Kelley in Stamp Collecting 1970 was also of no assistance, however, it did mention that "the company used a number of very interesting private fiscal adhesives."

My stamps sat on a shelf until one day I was looking in *The Stamps of Turkey* by Adolf Passer. Because of the ineffectual service of the Turkish post

# Relief Printed CMP Stamps—Postage Dues of Bosnia-Herzegovina, Part I

Editor's Note: This is a continuation of the series of articles adapted from a book on classic multicolored postage stamps currently being written by the author.

Multicolor and Superior Artistry—on a Lowly Postage Due Label!?

t the beginning of the last century, when costs accelerated prohibitively with each color beyond the first, why would any country print multicolored *postage due* stamps? After all, postage due *labels* are not even postage stamps in the strict sense of the term, since they do not prepay postage and are, according to Kenneth Wood, "purely an official indication of an amount due the postal service on an item of delivered mail" (Wood, vol. 2, p. 596). In the earlier history of these lowly labels, as we are reminded by Rick Miller, they sometimes were printed without the country's name, since they were viewed by postal authorities as "an internal accounting tool that would only be seen and used by postal clerks within the country" (Miller, *Linn's*, Nov. 30, 2009, p. 6).

Why waste resources, then, to print fancy multicolored labels for a mundane, ho-hum, bureaucratic postal function? Indeed, there is only one classic-era set for which the puzzlement of that

question applies. Bosniais Herzegovina (Austria-Hungary), Scott J1-J13 (Figure 1). (The Scott catalogue Togo, J21, 1927, printed three original ink colors, i.e., including overprint, but I

believe, instead, that the "black" is only the *apparent* effect of the ultramarine printed over the brown orange, and that the Togo stamp is therefore a bi-color.)

Having placed postage due labels in the *back* of "the back of the book", Wood went on to state that they are "generally not very attractive" (italics added). True, he relented some to note that, while many countries had

discontinued the use of such labels (by the 1980s), others were "beginning to produce attractive multicolored pictorial postage due labels". But

negatively again, he stated that these later efforts were "obviously aimed at philatelic sales" (Wood, vol. 2, p. 597). Such slights having been written, I can only wonder whether it was the 1904 J-labels Bosnia-Herzegovina that crossed Wood's mind as exceptions the whole "generally" unattractive bunch. For, in my opinion, these black, red and

yellow (or green in the case of J13) *numericals* are—well, a bit flamboyant—but still very pretty stamps. (And I can only guess that the reader agrees.) The choice of colors was probably inspired by the Bosnia-Herzegovina coat of arms current at the time of issue.

The stamps are not only colorful, they are intricate and highly artistic in design. So much so that E. C. Coleman wrote, perhaps with some exaggeration:

Wahrscheinlich ist dies der interessanteste und komplizierteste Entwurf, der je von der Post als Gesamtentwurf gemacht wurde. Kein anderer konnte diesem an Kunstfertigkeit gleichkommen. [This is probably the most interesting and most complicated overall design that was ever made by the (Austrian) postal service. No other one comes close to equaling it in artistry (craftsmanship)] ("Bosnien-Herzegowina: Portomarken 1904", Philatelistische Forschungsblätter, 12/75).

This small label is indeed filled with elaborate detail: First is a delicate yellow under-printing that spans the entire stamp and consists of double-lined six-pointed stars, which in turn are connected by triplicate slanted lines to form a continuous diamond

configuration—and all of this in a field of fine, interrupted, horizontal lines (Figure 2). The star motif is barely identifiable without magnification. Under

normal view, the underprinting's impression is that of a mottled yellow and white texture. Coleman stated the design's colors result in leather-like ("lederartig") appearance,

but that is not quite my own impression. Nor do I know any special significance of the six-pointed stars. Perhaps the Austrian printers simply wanted to create an interesting parchment-like texture in the stamp's background. But why on a lowly postage due label?

Then there are the remaining decorations: oak leaves (Figure 3), stylized fan, asterisks, and beadedeffect on the oval. Add to this a total of four varieties of font in either black or red, including the inscribed authority: MILIT. POST-PORTOMARKE ("Military

flowers, beads on the oval, no under-printing, one color—brown (Figure 4). Why the costly extras for the Bosnia-Herzegovina labels?

# Aside: Postage Due Labels and the Classicist Admiration for Engine-Turning

A side comment about the aesthetics of postage due labels: Are such labels *indeed* a bunch of plainness, with only a few exceptions? There are, in fact, numerous early postage due labels—mostly in the Americas—whose designs include the intricacies of *engine-turning* 

(geometric lathe-work). Many collectors view such labels, with their tiny *bank-note* aura, as rather attractive—further exceptions to Kenneth Wood's generalization about the unattractiveness of the entire lot. See, for example, the early postage due labels of Brazil, Canada, China, Costa Rica, Cuba, Ecuador, Haiti, Mexico, Nicaragua, El Salvador, the United States and Uruguay (Figure 5). Wood himself defined engineturning as a procedure that "not only provides *beautiful* designs but renders forgery a great deal more difficult" (Wood, vol. 1, p. 235; italics added).

Engine-turning (by the Perkins "rose engine") was present at the very birth of stamps—on the 1840 Penny

Black. In the dogma of classicist philately, engine-turning seems to be a guaranteed mark of beauty. If so, why? Because it is, in truth, beautiful? Or perhaps also because it links stamp design to the gravitas of the bank note? Questions for another article.



My own view, however, is that these partially engine-turned

postage due designs—whether they have aesthetic merit or not—fall far below the level of craftsmanship and expense entailed by the multicolored Bosnia-Herzegovina design, which certainly required triplicate plates and triplicate impressions, but which also involved hand-work in the engraving of the original dies. The actual extent of the latter, I do not know. All that I have is Coleman's generalization that the design's craftsmanship was unparalleled. And again the question: Why?

#### Clumsy Imperialism

Under the terms of the Berlin Congress of 1878, Austria-Hungary began military occupation of Bosnia-Herzegovina in that same year. In other words, this mostly rural Balkan territory, populated by Muslims, Jews, Orthodox Christians and Catholic Christians, almost all Slavs, became a protectorate of the Habsburg emperor, Franz Joseph. The protectorate was still, in theory, a part of the Ottoman Empire, but effective control was assumed by a joint commission of both Austria and Hungary, with highest territorial administration in the hands of two Habsburg appointees: a military governor and a finance minister.

office at the time and treaty obligations, foreign post offices and shipping companies provided the only effective means of moving international mail. Passer included a section on Private Companies and Local Posts in his book. In this section, I found a listing of my stamps. They are a set of 11 red stamps, 50 centimes to 10 Kreuzer, which were parcel post stamps for the D.D.S.G., issued in 1889 (Figure 2). Passer also lists two postage due stamps: a 3kr blue (Figure 3) and a 10kr red, both issued in 1889.

The article by Hurt and Kelley in the May 1950 American Philatelist goes into great detail on the

problems of identifying the first four issues of the Danube Steam Navigation Company. There were numerous forgeries and reprints because of the demand from stamp collectors. Now they have fallen out of favor. Can any member provide more information of the stamps of the

D.D.S.G.? Do I have genuine stamps, forgeries or reprints?

This is a very important company in the history of Europe and the Middle East. I hope the cycles of philatelic interest will again bring these stamps into prominence so we can learn more about them.

#### Whatzit Answers

Everyone agreed that Whatzit 27.4.2 was a Russian stamp. The answers were equally divided between Russia #9 and #30. The big difference between the two

stamps is the paper, which can't be examined in a scan.

Whatzit 27.6.1 was the most answered Whatzit to date. All responses thought that it was something to do with the Indian Federated State of Faridkot. The majority think it is a revenue, but no one has a catalogue number. The remainder were divided between a fantasy and a

reprint. I checked closer and must rule out the Afghanistan revenue for Hindu protective tax. I think we will have to wait until a catalogue of Indian Federated States is found to provide a definitive answer.

I stand corrected on Whatzit 27.6.3. The value of this stamp is 100 Rs. It is a Brazilian revenue. The text at the top of the stamp reads "charity tax". Because the value of this stamp is 100 Rs and the letter rate in 1900-15 was 100 Reis, then a good guess at the date for this revenue is early 1900's.

As for Whatzit 28.1.4, the key is in the text just above "correos" which reads "vrvgvay". If you replace the "v"s with "u"s you get the right country, Uruguay.

The stamp was issued on 18 May 1944 and is Michel #650. It is part of a three stamp series that commemorates 75 years of the "Swiss Colony" (1c on 3c, 5c on 7c and 10c on 12c). They represent monument to the colonists Aristide Bassi. According to Michel, the stamps were never issued without the overprints.

New Whatzits

Whatzit 28.3.1 is an overprint of the Pakistan stamp, Scott #68. I can't find any reference to this overprint in Scott, Michel or Barefoot. Usage, date, etc. is needed.

I have an imperf group of four North Vietnam stamps: 3 HAO brown, 4 HAO blue (Whatzit 28.3.2), 6 HAO green and 9 HAO red. I checked Scott and Michel without success. I need any information on these stamps.

Whatzit 28.3.3 is brown, depicts a gateway, has an 1 Pta value, has a blue pen cancel, is from Spanish Morocco and is a telegraph stamp. In addition, I have a purple 50 Cts stamp with the same design. I want to know when these telegraph stamps were used and what composed the set of these stamps.

We have a schedule for the remaining issues of this year's *The Circuit*. I need help. So far this year, I have received only one member's Whatzit since my appeal for assistance. It is a Whatzit in this issue. My cupboard is bare. Is there any topic that you think the membership would be interested in? This column is only as good as the assistance I receive from members.

(Austria-Hungary also had an 1881 "confidential" understanding with Russia and Germany that it could annex the protectorate at any time it wished.)

The occupation did occur not without armed resistance. According Noel Malcolm, Austrians the made the same mistake they had made in the past, believing "that they would b e welcomed by most the of Bosnian population".

Instead, an ill-organized force of approximately 40,000 volunteers, both Orthodox and Muslim Bosnians (with minimal Catholic support), waged a primarily guerrilla war against approximately twice as many well-trained, well-equipped Austrian troops. It took three months to defeat the resistance (Malcolm, pp. 134-138).

The earliest stamps of the occupying administration (for use by the military only) were issues of Austria and Hungary. Quickly, in 1879, Vienna printed stamps especially for Bosnia-Herzegovina. The issuance of these new stamps, bearing the Habsburg coat of arms but without any country inscription (Figure 6), was

preceded the same year by a partial extension of the military postal service to civilians. The postage due labels, issued much later in 1904, were also intended for civilian Bosnian postal service, although Alfred Kugel noted that "examples of the postage dues

cover are very elusive" (Kugel stamp exhibit). Robert Witkosky has reported that "this issue was used not

only in Bosnia proper but [later, 1913-15] in the Austrian-occupied areas of Russian Poland, Montenegro and Albania" (Witkosky, *The American Philatelist*, June, 1993, p. 547). The labels were identified as "military post"—but again without the protectorate's name. The name Bosnia-Herzegovina did not appear on stamps until issuance of the famously beautiful intaglio scenic series of 1906 (Figure 7).

All of this seems indicative of the Austrians' clumsy imperialism, even amidst their efforts to win support of the people of Bosnia-Herzegovina. They issued stamps especially for the protectorate, but imprinted with the occupier's coat of arms and devoid of the protectorate's name. They spent lavishly on colorful postage due labels, superb in craftsmanship and referential to the protectorate with regard to color, but still without the name. James Mackay suggested that the omission of the name Bosnia-Herzegovina occurred "in view of the multi-national composition of the population" (Mackay, p. 179). He had in mind, of

course, the division of the protectorate's population into Muslim, Serb, Croat and Jewish communities, especially at a time when neighboring Serbia, as well as Croat regions in the Habsburg empire, were roiling in nationalist sentiment and activity, some of which was spilling into Bosnia-Herzegovina. Mackay's suggestion is puzzling, however, as I will explain in Part II of this article. For now, it seems safe to say that the occupiers were simply heavy-handed in their imperialism, even to the hindrance of their own desire to unify the protectorate's diverse communities. Finally, Austrians "got it right" (more or less) in the 1906-12 series (Figure 7)—high craftsmanship, innovatively decorative frames designed by Vienna artist Koloman Moser, indigenous scenic subjects (except for Franz Josef's portrait on Scott 45/61), the territory's name (although unfortunately in German)—but now too late.

#### **Empire of Illusions**

Too late because Austria-Hungary's 1908 outright annexation of Bosnia-Herzegovina, an imperialist action far worse than clumsy, had probably been Franz

Josef's intention for several years prior to 1908. Certainly by 1906, "[t]he Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, Baron von Aehrenthal, began to consider seriously an eventual take-over of Serbia" and, as well, the outright annexation of Bosnia-Herzegovina as a consolidated position from which to move forward militarily—Nach Salonik—even as far as Greece (Malcolm, p. 150). Such planning suggests the degree of illusion that had crept into this declining empire's estimates of its own military strength-an illusion made evident, later, in the initial war losses of the Austria-Hungary army to the lowly Serbian army. Serbian World War I victories occurred at the battles of Cer Mountain and Kolubara, 1914. Only with the help of the Germans and Bulgarians was Austria-Hungary eventually able to over-run and occupy Serbia (Glenny, pp. 312-17; 331-38).




Figure 9—Moser original frame designs Bosnia-Herzegovina, Scott 65-80, 1912 (illustration from Koloman Moser: Gemälde, Graphiken, Briefmarken)

And symbolic of a return to imperialist dreams, all new *regular* stamp designs of Bosnia-Herzegovina (after the 1906-12 scenic types) are portraits of Emperors Franz Josef or Karl I (Figure 8)—but still with frames decorated by Koloman Moser (Figure 9).

The annexation's legacy is well-known: Extreme agitation within Serbia, including an increase in terrorist organizing among elements of the Serbian military (the *Black Hand*) and university students (*Young Bosnia*) (Glenny, pp. 281-306); then, in 1914, the Sarajevo (Bosnia-Herzegovina) assassination of Austria's Duchess Sophia and Archduke Francis

Ferdinand (Franz Josef's successor-to-be) by a Bosnian Serb student; declaration of war by Austria-Hungary on Serbia; mobilization of the Russian army in support of Serbia; declaration of war by Germany on Russia, *etc.*, *etc.*, . . . the chain reaction that embroiled all of the great and not-so-great powers in World War I. At the end of

the war, all Habsburg illusions lay shattered. Austria-Hungary "literally broke apart into its ethnic components, each of which now aimed at gaining complete political independence" (Jelavich & Jelavich, p. 80). In 1918, Bosnia-Herzegovina became part of the

Kingdom of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes (SHS), later (1929) the Kingdom of Yugoslavia (Figure 10).

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# Trick Solution for Unsoakable Stamps

t Summer Seminar this year, I was shown a way to remove those irremovable self-stick stamps from the paper. It works like a charm, even on the *Linn's* list of stamps to leave on the paper. It sounds crazy, but it's amazing!

You will need a can of Pure Citrus Orange Air Freshener. You can find it in almost any grocery store. Get the one that is 100% natural, non-aerosol (air-propelled). You cannot use regular air fresheners. Another option is a natural lemon freshener made by Zep and sold in Home Depot stores.

Place the stamp face down in a dish, spray the paper back side lightly, wait 5-6 seconds (yes, seconds) and then peel the stamp off the paper. It will come easily. Note that the adhesive will remain on the stamp, not on the paper. To remove the adhesive, rewet the gum side with the spray, lay the stamp flat and use a credit card or similar flat plastic edged item at an angle



to gently scrape it away—wipe card on a paper towel as you go. Afterwards, use a Q-tip or paper towel to rub back for any remaining adhesive. Another option is to sprinkle the back with talc or corn starch to make it non-tacky. Let the stamp dry overnight before you hinge it into your album-pressed flat in a book if necessary. This technique does not work with "lick and stick" stamps. It is meant for self-adhesives.

I was told that a more expensive product called Bestine, sold in art supply stores, may work similarly, but I have not had personal experience with it. I encourage you to give it a try. It wowed the Sacramento Philatelic Society when demonstrated there.
