

s ISWSC president, I occasionally receive correspondence from new ISWSC members. One of the more common themes in this correspondence is, "Ok, now that I've joined, who can I trade with??" Here are a few of the many ISWSC options available to all ISWSC members:

#### **Member Roster Issue**

Approximately every other year, the March-April ISWSC newsletter gives way to the roster issue. This issue, strictly for ISWSC member use only, provides an alphabetical listing of ISWSC members and their

interest codes (e.g. collecting interests, types of stamps collected, worldwide collecting experience (in terms of years), age, topicals collected, and other Listings interests). membership number, geographical location, and by popular collecting interests are also provided.

Between roster issues, the membership data is updated in our newsletter. An up-to-date hard copy or electronic version of the data is also available for a fee from our Executive Director, Tony Zollo (#856). Pick a member with interest codes similar to yours, and you may have a trading partner!

Write to the member prior to sending any material to be traded and be sure to include a SASE (self-addressed stamped envelope) or IRCs (International Reply Coupons).

#### **Swap Circuit Program**

If one-on-one trades with members aren't for you, try the Swap Circuit program! A complete description of this stamp-for-stamp trading program is found in another article in this newsletter.

#### **OMNI Stamp Exchange**

This program allows members to exchange their duplicates for those of other members on a catalog value basis. Unfortunately, this program is only available for USA and Canadian members (due to limitations on insuring stamp shipments), but it does provide the majority of the ISWSC membership with an affordable way of disposing of duplicates and filling in some spaces in your album.

#### Sales Circuit Program

If trading on a per-stamp or on a catalog value basis isn't for you, then the Sales Circuit program is for you! As a seller, you mount stamps in a circuit

> book and price each entry. Books are then sent to the program manager who records them and sends them on to other ISWSC members who are interested in buying the material. Like the OMNI program, this program is also limited to the USA and Canada.

(If anyone can figure out an affordable way of insuring shipments overseas, please contact me!!)

#### **Auction Program**

Another program available to all members is our auctions. Periodically auctions are held of material submitted by other ISWSC members. You can either sell unwanted material or purchase something for your collection. Some members graciously donate lots to be auctioned to help keep dues low and to provide the society with extra funds to bring you're the best in programs and services!

# Expand Your Collection – Join the Swap Circuits!

ow that winter has officially started in the upper-Midwest, it is time once again to get serious about stamp collecting. (Not that you can't be serious in the summer, too, but we only get so many weeks to be outside!) One popular way to add stamps to your collection is through the Swap

Circuit program.

Here's how the program works. Participants are grouped into a 4 or 5 member circuit. The first member of the group is sent a routing sheet (containing the names and addresses of the other members of the circuit and the manager who creates the circuits) and a packet of all different off-paper stamps. The first member selects the stamps he/she wants, then replaces them with an equal number of quality all different off-paper stamps. The routing sheet and the stamp packet is then mailed to the next member of the circuit.

The process continues until the last member receives the packet and makes his/her swaps. Then the packet is mailed back to the manager of the circuit, along with mint postage for sending out the next circuit. The manager then changes the order of the members, creates a new packet of stamps, and sends it back out to the participants. Once all members of the circuit have been in each position on the circuit (from first to last), a new circuit is formed with a new grouping of participants.

There are currently four circuit types to select from: Regular, Small, CTO, and Super. The Regular circuits consist of 100 stamps that are considered "large" in size – more than 1" x 1 \_ " (approximately) in size. Because the Regular circuits are the most popular, participants are assigned to one or more manager based on the number of circuits the

participant wishes to receive.

Small circuits, containing 100-150 stamps are just the opposite of the Regular circuits – those stamps smaller than 1" x 1 \_" in size. The Small circuits also contain definitive stamps of any size.

CTO, or Cancelled To Order, circuits contain 100 stamps and are the only circuit where CTO stamps can be traded.

The last circuit type, the Super circuit, is the same as the Regular circuits, however each stamp packet contains 200 stamps instead of 100. Stamps in all circuits must be off paper, but they may be mint or used, hinged or unhinged.

In order for the program to operate, annual fees

are charged to Swap Circuit participants. (The term "fee" is used to distinguish them from the separate dues charged annually to be an ISWSC member. ISWSC membership is required to participate in any ISWSC program.) Except for the programs' annual fees, no cash is needed – for each stamp you select, you simply replace it with another stamp, without regard to the catalog value! In order to maintain the quality of the program, members are, however, encouraged to only swap desirable stamps – common and damaged stamps are not allowed.

If you want to start putting your duplicates to work for you, please join the Swap Circuit program! To join, complete the form accompanying this article and mail it with your fees to the address on the form. If you would like more information prior to joining the program, please contact Randy Smith (postal and e-mail addresses are listed on page 2).

# **Computer Fraud (Forgeries)**

know it is difficult for a computer person, who has used the internet to build his collection, communicate with fellows of like interest, found information to help build an exhibit, able to do business at the push of a button... But from such a person a warning; unplug the monster living off of promise and delivering complication after complication.

I'd like to add to the trickle of information about the forgeries on the Internet, with regard to stamps at least. There are a dozen "sellers" — who have changed their names often — who have sold illustrations from catalogs as genuine stamps. If you are lucky you are slow paying and they have fled

before your money arrives.

Unfortunately, being an international group we aid and abet the forgery and fraud. We like every government, club, dealers association, members association — where these last two aren't the same thing, e.g. APS of the US — can't or will not do any thing about bogus deals or scams. Even the UPU

has thrown in the towel on mail fraud between nations.

How about the guys who claim no two packages alike? This has proved both in covers and stamps as well as stamp packets to the barest shadow of truth. Their explanation for the lack of "fraud" usually comes out something like "it can never be 'exactly' alike, then the same stamps would have to be in two places at once."

One of the values of an auction has been that the article passes through the hands of an auctioneer. Whether expert or not he does provide the assurance that the item is a stamp, and after some time (that's why dealing with an established firm is so worth while) some degree of safety. But eBay, which calls itself an auctioneer or auction site, is misusing the term. The only thing they do that is auction-like is collect fees. A classified ad service, a flea market, a catch all of some kind yet to be named, but not an auction.

#### **Canadian Postage Rates to Increase**

Bill Silvester (#1058), manager of the CTO circuits and the Super circuits, has informed me that Canadian postal rates will increase on January 1, 2004. For a one-ounce mailing (covering CTO circuits), rates from Canada to the USA will increase from the current \$0.65 rate to \$0.80. The same mailing going overseas will increase from the current \$1.25 rate to \$1.40. It is expected that rate increases will be similar for two-ounce mailings (covering the Super circuits).

Because of this postage increase, the last person on each CTO and Super circuit will now need to include more mint postage when returning circuits to Bill. If this increase poses a difficulty for you, please contact me. (Contact information can be found on page 2 of this newsletter.)

#### Stamp Fee Monetary Equivalent Raised

Speaking of increases... For the past few years, participants of the Swap Program have had the option to either send stamps or a monetary equivalent in lieu of stamps when paying their

annual Swap Program fees. The money gathered from the fees is used to purchase additional stamps for the circuits as well as purchasing postage, reimbursing managers for their expenses, etc. Because prices for purchasing quality stamps have gone up, effective immediately I am increasing the monetary equivalent for stamps from \$4.00 per 100 stamps to \$5.00 per 100 stamps.

#### Renewal Forms to be Mailed

Current Swap Circuit participants will automatically receive 2004 renewal forms in mid-January. Current participants are encouraged to wait for this form to arrive prior to submitting their Swap Circuit fees for 2004 as several participants will receive credits for overpayment of 2003 fees, poor J-Z Regular Circuit service, etc. ISWSC members not currently participating in the Swap Circuit program are encouraged to join the program by completing and returning the form found elsewhere in this newsletter.

My thanks to current managers Scott Sadger (#882), Bill Silvester (#1058), and Ken Wills (#2150) for their hard work and for all ISWSC members who participant in this wonderful program!



# Whatzit?

ur September/October Whatzit asked for help with an item showing earth-moving equipment. Only one reader responded, noting the letters were mainly in Hebrew. This prompted me to ask a contact in Israel for help. From him I learned its source was the Jewish National Fund (Keren Kayameth Le'Israel - the "KKL" at the bottom).

From the Web site of the Sol Singer Collection of Philatelic Judaica at Emory University I obtained



further information: the Fund "was established in 1901 by the Fifth World Zionist Congress to purchase land in Zion for a Jewish state. By the time the State of Israel

was founded in 1948, the JNF owned 12.5 percent of the land." Since then the Fund has provided national, charitable and educational services.

"The JNF began printing stamps in 1902 as a concrete symbol of the Jewish state envisioned by the Zionist leadership, as a way to publicize JNF ideology, and as a way to raise the needed funds. During the past 100 years, over 4,200 stamps have been issued. In 1939 the 21st Zionist Conference required that all national Zionist organizations place a JNF stamp alongside the required postage on all official correspondence. When the State of Israel was established in 1948, JNF stamps were used as regular postage for a few weeks until official Israeli stamps could be printed."

Since then they have apparently served as charity seals. This one promotes development of the Yatir area.



Back in July/August 2002 this column showed a Chinese stamp with Sun Yat-sen and asked for reader help. None was forthcoming. Recently I asked Dr. Danny Ko of the China Stamp Society, and he kindly replied that it was a postal savings stamp issued in Kiangsi



Province. Chinese postal savings stamps often show up in mixtures.



Here's another stamp that lacks a country name. It is a military stamp from Finland and listed in Scott.



Note the symbols of the sword and the posthorn.

Last time we showed a Tannu Tuva stamp that was not listed in Scott. I understand the new 2004 Scott Classic Specialized Catalogue

contains the Tannu Tuva issues from 1934-43 for the first time. Presumably this means these stamps will also be listed in the regular Scott Catalogues in 2005.

stamps.

## **Computer Fraud**

I would like to point out that the existence of hundreds of full sheets of stamps providing ample opportunity for "over-printing". Creating "new" finds! Most of these can be accomplished with a good inkjet printer. Some with a perforation machine... I recall a sheet of Czechoslovakian stamps perforated with the state of New Jersey perfin "S N J" in two lines (S on top) and sold as a special government perf like the "O.S." on British stamps. Notification to eBay draws no response or "we can not authenticate items put up for sale."

I heard many other stories especially from APS members. There must be some "back door" or way into the APS because almost every one of these thieves showed an APS member number that checked out. And after the problem, all the APS had to say was that they are "aware of the problem."

One of my all time favorites are the guys who perforate the stamps of Argentina diagonally, creating a new "class" of Bisect Forgeries of real stamps. I guess they technically aren't "forgeries" until they put them on envelopes and cancel them as if they were valid postage. And I guess you can include them in your collection as stamps of Argentina.

Still another "scam" is the sale of a study lot. The seller assembles a number of the same stamp. The lot includes reperfs, over prints, and cancels with a variety of colors, as well as attempts to change the color of the stamp to create a "group" worthy of

study. There might possibly be some real rarity here to be found.

By and large, most of the collectors here have learned these lessons either directly or indirectly over the last few years. However, most papers, magazines and other publications will not accept criticism of the "internet." This has only lead to even bigger and better frauds, not to better collecting or stamp purchasing. The ease and slickness of the process has blinded many to possibilities of misuse and abuse.

As a substitute for mail — such as catalogs, picture post cards, lists of stamps available and several other things — the internet has been and continues to be effective. But as an impersonalized, faceless or masked face of scammers it has provided new and vastly different opportunity for the nefarious.

One explanation I heard compares the use of the computer to the use of credit cards: once you start, it is so-o-o-o hard to stop. I guess until there is an organization to help you out of the pit you dig with either credit cards or computers, it will not be recognized as a disease. (I think that has happened for the credit cards... can computers be far behind?) I worry that when it comes to forming the computer group, no one will be able or willing to do so. What other way is there to make money through computers anonymously?

I would like to conclude with something like "happy hunting" the ever optimistic reply of the eager geek. But realize, you, I am the hunted!



# The Plebiscites of Post WWI Germany

✓ his is the first in a series of articles dealing with the plebiscites that formed on German territorial borderlands following WWI and the Treaty of Versailles. This article is intended to provide the

introduction to the German plebiscites and explain what they were and why they were significant. Future articles will focus on the individual plebiscites and detail chronologically the events that took place leading up to and after the vote.

After the Central Powers' defeat in WWI, Germany was in a state of chaos. The allied

nations, including Britain, France, and the U.S. among others, felt bitter about the war and wanted to punish Germany to the full extent possible for its involvement. The Treaty of Versailles, which was concocted by the allied nations after the war, imposed harsh terms on Germany.

The harsh terms were literally forced upon the Germans, who had little say in the matter. Included in the treaty were \$33 million dollars in reparations payments for Allied war costs, demilitarization of the German-French border, (including the Rhineland,) reduction of the German military to only to a "token force" complete loss of all oversees German colonies. and redistribution of lands formerly belonging to the German and Austria-Hungarian Empires, (the Central Powers in WWI). Most humiliating of all to the German people was an acknowledgement of complete responsibility for the war including all losses and damages incurred by the Allied powers.

This was demoralizing and the German people felt it. It is said that not a single German thought that

> their country was solely responsible for the war. These emotions would continue to shape Germany in the years to come.

> A main point of the Treaty of Versailles had been the redistribution of land belonging to the Central Powers. Whole nations were carved out of the former empires; for example,

Czechoslovakia, Poland, Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. All of these newly formed nations began to issue their own stamps. Many new border regions were also formed on the frontier territory of what was to become the new Germany.


Many of these regions were placed under the

mandate of the League of Nations, conglomeration of the developed countries formed by the Treaty of Versailles, which was a forerunner to the United Nations). These regions would remain occupied by allied forces for a predestinated amount of time before a plebiscite vote was to be held.

I shall explain what a plebiscite vote is and why they were held in the German border territories after WWI. Webster's Dictionary defines plebiscite as; "A vote by which the people of an entire country or district express an opinion for or against a

# The Plebiscites of Post WWI Germany

proposal, especially on a choice of government or ruler."

In the case of the German border territories, the plebiscite was used to determine which nation the inhabitants wished to become part of. Various territories over the many different German borders were put to plebiscite votes. The regions

included the coal rich Saarland, (on the French border), the cow pastures and dairy farms of Schleswig, (on the Danish border), Allenstein, Carinthia, Eastern Silesia, Marienwerder, and Upper Silesia all along the newly formed Polish border. Many of these territories issued stamps in the in term period before their votes were to take place.

The country of Poland had been created in 1919 by the allies from large tracts of German and Russian land. German land that was forfeited to Poland included West Prussia (or "Posen" in German) and a strip of land known as the "Polish Corridor," which connected Poland to the Baltic Sea. This separated Germany in two, cutting off Eastern Prussia from mainland Germany. This corridor caused major disputes and led to future aggression in the region.
