

Insurance Policy Pays Off

ver the past year, the ISWSC has had to place an insurance claim for a few mailings that became lost (for various reasons). While our insurance paid for these losses, there are a few things you can do to prevent future claims and keep our insurance rates low.

- 1 When mailing items, use the ecipients complete address and include our full return address. Placing those addresses inside the package will also help in the event the outside addresses are ruined.
- 2 NEVER refuse a mailing. Doing so may lead to your removal from that program (i.e. Omni or Sales Circuit).
- **3** If you will be gone for an

- extended period of time (i.e. more than two weeks), notify the appropriate manager(s) far in advance of your time away. This gives the managers time to either hold mailings until your return or place you later in rotation.
- 4 Notify your spouse, children or estate executor of what should happen to your collection upon your death or prolonged illness. For ISWSC material, make sure they are kept together with instructions as to who to contact if you are unable to return the materials.
 - 5 If a claim is necessary, contact the appropriate manager and the ISWSC Executive Director quickly. Insurance claims must be filled within a short period of time of the loss in order to be considered.

to the office as described by *Robert's Rules of Order* and recommends such action as he/she believes will increase the effectiveness of the organization.

Secretary

This person keeps a permanent record of all society Board of Director proceedings, including Board meetings and votes. The Secretary also attests to all legal documents of the Society and performs other duties as requested by the Board and/or the Executive Director.

Vice President for Public Relations

This person performs duties with respect to promoting the ISWSC, monitors and assists the ISWSC Regional Representatives, and is responsible for securing an Elections Chairman.

Vice President for Charitable Programs

This person serves as Chairperson for the Youth Program and assumes other responsibilities as assigned by the Board. This person also serves in place of the President, should the President be absent or unable to serve.

The term of office for each position is two years with a maximum of two consecutive years in the same office. Individuals in these positions, along with two at-large directors elected in opposite years, comprise the ISWSC Board and are responsible for the oversight and management of the ISWSC.

Any member of the ISWSC is eligible to run for elected office. To express your interest in running for a position, to obtain more information, or to recommend a fellow member for an office, please contact Randy Smith (#1111), ISWSC President, or Tony Zollo (#856) ISWSC Executive Director. Nominations must be received by September 15, 2005.

Art Stamp Collecting

The Circuit!!!

I'm a kid collector, for the last 60 years. One of the things that turned me on to stamp collecting was the "Truck Sheet." Back in the day, that dim dark past hidden in stories about a president who collected stamps, a king and later a queen who did the same. Where a truck from the Post Office came to my school and gave away pictures of the White House on a huge stamp.

Pen pals all over the world — what a great way to get stamps, learn languages, learn cultures, traditions. Of course, the computer and e-mail does that today — or does it? But how else could you travel, meet other people, make contact. My wife is constantly disturbed that I know some obscure answer on Jeopardy. And when I attribute it to stamp collecting she gets that "and I thought that was a waste of time" look.

Having spent some time in Korea, the great statistics of stamps collecting were brought into sharper focus. Counting the number and type of stamps issued by a country became an indicator of its goodness. Countries like Russia — who put out hundreds of issues in multiple formats with silly high values or long sets — were considered philatelic pigs. Gouging the stamp collector for money, commemorating events of dubious merit. Buying these stamps was equated with supporting the government of that country.

The Art stamp craze did some to abet this, but eventually the "Sand Dune" countries over worked the pockets of collectors. I'm sure I'm missing other examples along the way, but I collected as best as I could. There were periods of time when I could not get to my collection, sometimes for a year or two.

One things that always caused me wonder was "mint never hinged ... Why? The history of stamp collecting is really expressly against such an idea. Early pin boards of Nassau Street. The earliest collector who pasted the first issue on her dressing room wall (that may be a myth, but a motivational one).

Tropical Collector, particularly India were great collectors. It was a way to keep in touch with home. But it had drawbacks — stamps curl, get stuck to things. The solution: many early issues were ungummed so these things would not happen. Stamps that came with gum were often "soaked" to remove the gum. Aside for the "cottage industry" regumming, which sprang up around this concept, there is no rational reason for checking the gum.

A Perfin forefunner was the printing of the company name on the back of the stamp under the gum to prevent unauthorized use of company postage. Of course, the holes made ownership visible from both sides.

One area of feedback that is of interest is how many albums do you have? I started way back with one small paper-covered album of worldwide stamps, where some countries got half a page. What did you start with and how many do you have now for your worldwide collection?

y wife succumbed to the reasoning that it was easier to have an album full of small pieces of paper than walls full of holes and hanging paintings to cover them up. She collected with some enthusiasm for some time, but eventually fell by the wayside when the numbers grew too high and expensive.

You know, back in the dark ages, a wife would go fly fishing or play golf to share a hobby with her husband, to connect on another level. It did make her much more tolerant of the vast and ubiquitous matter of worldwide collecting.

Still another great reason for collecting stamps was to modify the "jock" image. I was a big boy — played football, a weighman on the track team. I had a geek side, too — played chess, had an interest in politics and eventually was a mathematics major. But the stamp collecting seemed to convince the girls I was a "gentle giant." (Most Big Guys are push-overs anyway. Although if they have a military background that could be different.)

Any number of things can be gained from having an outsider look at what you are doing. But pointing out things are "stupid" isn't one you seek out. Keeping all those stamps, and where is one of them. That's why I joined ISWSC. Still waiting for the trading and exchanging to kick in. I've found an outlet in the 4-H locally and just recently I came up with a lesson developing the basic skills of learning using stamps. But I've yet to make contact with any other member. Don't have a membership list. Not sure, after two years, if we trade, exchange, use catalogs or what is a Circuit. Are there still more fees, other than membership, before I get to the trading part?

My wife has also indicated that all those catalogues are redundant. If I limit my collection to before a certain year, I'll need only one or two catalogues. I've often wondered why Scott provides a "brief" history or at least a chronicle of the country

at the beginning of each country listing, except those of South America. If you get stuck on "Postal History" or the beginnings of stampdom for a country these notes are very helpful.

Of course, "the proof is left to the student" is a great dodge of mathematicians, or "it's obvious" another. So what's your story? Why? Or How do you collect? Still waiting for feedback on the number of albums you use to store your worldwide collection.

As I collected the world, I noticed a number of patterns. If you look at the early issues, almost all

are that almost square little profile of his or her majesty. The alternative is basic numbers or just text. After the Cape of Good Hope and its triangle, the size and shape of stamps seemed less rigid. Color became an element of attraction, and later different pictures in a series.

If you wanted to discover who started it and why among particularly the "classic" period, of early stamps it would be difficult. Closer to today, the advent of things like the three dimensional stamps — again depending on how it is defined — is easily seen. (The problem arises if you

call pressed or relief stamps three dimensional.) The hologram which appears to give a depth to the subject of the stamp, the pressed out or stamped relief kind, and those that have a real depth of material.

An interesting area of collecting but by no means the end of the novelty in ideas for stamps. Recall the phonograph record stamp? The "Gold" stamps? Stamps shaped like their county of origin? And once the technology permitted, almost any shape that could be part of a tiling (mathematical term for congruent piece which fit together to cover a larger plane). I'm sure there are other "strange" stamps in this wide world. I'd like to hear about your example.

Perfins are another kettle of fish... At a time when postage was not a significant amount security was. The patterns of holes are many and varied. There exists a group who has produced a catalog/album of the more than six thousand patterns. The thrill of discovery is hard to come by in philately, except in the field of perfins where knowing who used which pattern — and proving it — is a task of some magnitude. If you consider the perfins of the world, it is even more so. With the hundredth anniversary of perfin use in the Unites States coming in 2008, this is a field to watch.

Do you write letters any more? Do you have a pen pal? On the web, do you discuss stamps with your fellow e-mailers? Have you ever thought of searching for famous stamp collectors? Will Smith, Laura Bush, the Nobel Prize winners, local politicians (state, county, town). If you don't want to do it, send me the name, address and other information. I'd like to do an article on them, about their collection.

First Day covers are one of the best examples of an idea gone wild. In the beginning, it was the earliest use — back then when stamps were issued at one place, you had to know somebody. But when the Post Office saw the chance to make money at it, many places were available. But that wasn't good enough. They had to extend, for months, the period of time

for which covers marked First Day could be gotten. Well, that brought true collectors back to First Day of Use collecting. About the only thing that has changed is the amount of information that is available about an issue.

Of course, we can argue the meaning of First Day of Issue as opposed to what actually happens. You can order them as much as 90 days in advance and they are available up to six months after the date. The "history" which was to be highlighted by issuing the stamp was soon being given away by cachet

manufactures at a good price. I'm sure there are exceptions, but the majority of FDCs are valueless in the philatelic community. Just try to sell most of them for what you paid for them. Foreign postal authorities have quickly followed the American lead and the histories — "pages" which come with these First Day Covers — can be most instructive. They help in understanding the culture, traditions and society they are issued by.

Since the change-over on July 1, 1971 (sometimes referred to as the 7-1-71 affair), the Post Office has been moving away from the interest of collectors and becoming much more political. Mail in no longer an interest of the Post Office, packages and other things maybe. Incidentally, that date (7-1-71) was the last "record" first day cover use. More covers were serviced on that day and the surrounding months than any other or even possible stamp issued since.

Soon you'll have to explain why you use stamps on your letters. And yet they don't have to explain why we are issuing stamps for people who are not Americans, are opposed to the principles upon which this country operates, or have no possible connection to the United States in any way, shape, or form. The Post Office is rejecting our own history in favor of...

Well, I guess only the Postal Service knows. Who has influence on the stamps issued? Don't go the Citizens Advisory Group; there are collectors on that board and they are unable to turn the ship of fools.

A Mystery Solved

he only foreign stamp ever required to mail a letter in Canada was the Bahamas Special Delivery stamp (Scott #E1). This is an overprint on the beautiful 5d Queen's Staircase.

In February 1916, the Canadian post office arranged an exchange of special delivery stamps with the Bahamas. Six hundred of these Bahamas special delivery stamps were distributed on May 1, 1916, among four Canadian post offices — Ottawa, Toronto, Westmount and Winnipeg. A second consignment of Bahamas special delivery stamps was sent to Canada in early 1917.

A special delivery letter from Canada to the Bahamas was to bear the necessary Canadian postage, war tax and a Bahamas special delivery stamp. However, even before the second lot

of stamps was shipped, Canadian bureaucracy intervened and the arrangement was terminated. It appears that only some 430 of the original stamp shipment were used on postage. The remainders disappeared into limbo.

The mystery to me was how to identify the Bahamas special delivery stamp #E1 that was legal for use in Canada. Clearly, cancelled used stamps are

few and far between and covers are very expensive. There are three special delivery overprints on the Queen's staircase stamps. The first overprint was put over stamp on paper with the watermark Crown C.C. (Scott Wmk 1). These are the stamps that composed the first batch of stamps sent to Canada. Scott lists them as E1 Type I.

The second lot of stamps sent to Canada had the overprint on stamps using paper

watermarked with the Mult. CA (Scott Wmk. 2). The overprint differed slightly in that the word "SPECIAL" was reset so it is a bit more to the right

of the word "DELIVERY" beneath it (Scott E1, type II). The stamps bearing the other two overprints were used only in the Bahamas.

I was able to find this information after Mr. Alfred Peatman shared his extensive British Caribbean reference material with me.
