

And I want to express my thanks to Terry for agreeing to take on the Executive Director role. One of the intriguing aspects of Terry is that he is a world traveler. Although I haven't spoken to him about this, it is my hope that his journeys may help us bolster our membership – especially that of worldwide collectors living outside the United States. ISWSC applications in your suitcase, Terry??) As the Board and Terry begin their new relationship, I'm sure we'll see some new ideas surface to help the ISWSC and further its mission. Welcome, Terry!

One of the items the Board discussed before Terry was appointed were various methods for increasing our membership. As with most philatelic organizations, the ISWSC has seen a decrease in its membership over the past few years and the Board is working to reverse the trend. For those who don't know, the average demographics for a stamp collector in the United States is a white male, aged 70 or older. (Age, poor health, and selling off collections are often given as reasons when members don't renew...)

Being a mostly "virtual" organization, the ISWSC relies heavily on its membership to spread the word of the ISWSC and get others to join. To give you an additional incentive, the Board has authorized a special membership drive contest, with a very nice prize donated by Ken Wills (#2150). Details of this contest can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

Another item that I am excited about concerns a new ISWSC publication. I'm pleased to announce that Richard Rizzo (#2215) has asked the ISWSC Board to adopt his publication *World History and the Postage Stamp* as an official ISWSC publication.

Rizzo's work is the result of his starting a "one stamp per country" collection and researching the political history of each of those nations.

The Board officially adopted his nearly 400 page publication and are working out details concerning how to make his publication available to ISWSC members and also to nonmembers. Look for more information concerning this in a

future newsletter. My thanks to Richard for thinking of the ISWSC and congratulations on your publication!

Finally, just a reminder of two things. First, the ISWSC needs new volunteers to throw their tongs in the ring and run for one of the Board positions. Executive **Director Named**

he ISWSC Board recently voted to appoint Dr. Terry Myers (#736) as the new Executive Director, replacing Dr. Anthony (Tony) Zollo (#856) who had previously announced his need to retire from the position. Although you'll probably hear directly from Terry in future newsletters, here's a little background information about our new **Executive Director:**

Terry first joined the ISWSC in 1992. For years, he dreamed of completely filling a Scott International album - and now has managed to complete over 95% of that goal. He has been a collector since joining a stamp club in the fourth grade.

Terry and his wife, Marian, spent over 30 years

on the pediatric faculties at the University of Virginia, Creighton University, East Tennessee State University and Texas Tech University.

Terry is a clinical geneticist (specialist in birth defects) and Marian is a neonatologist. Terry's career developed into one of medical administration and he served as the chairman of several departments ultimately as an associate dean of clinical affairs. The Myers' have two adult sons and one tiny granddaughter.

In order to keep his collection current, Terry maintains standing order

accounts in dozens of philatelic agencies around the world, resulting in a lot of interestingly stamped mail arriving almost daily. His other major avocation is world travel and he has by now visited over 125 countries.

As part of these trips, Terry sends back fancy postcards with unusual stamps to the first grade classroom where his daughter-in-law teaches and where they now cover an entire wall!

The ISWSC Board wishes to thank Terry and the other candidates who expressed interest in the Executive Director position.

Buying New Issues Direct

bout 25 years ago I decided that my new issue dealer was simply charging me too much money by marking up many issues way above the face values. So I decided to see if it was possible to get the same stamp sets directly from the issuing philatelic agencies more cheaply. By now I have relationships with a bit over 100 agencies – and still use my new issue dealer for a lot of others where his prices are really lower than I can get by myself.

Collecting new issues can be a lot of fun, a lot of challenges, and sometimes major disappointments. Here are a few of the things I have learned over the years.

The philatelic agencies vary greatly in what services they provide. I initially got most of my information from Linn's Stamp Almanac but by now much of the information is not current. A simple postcard sent to each country's postal department usually gets a prompt response with a description of their services. And now many postal services have web sites, although many of them are not in English.

The easiest bureaus are ones that accept standing orders. In most cases it is necessary to send a deposit

and the value of each shipment is subtracted from the deposit which periodically you must top up. Recently several agencies have switched to using credit cards and with proper authorization simply charge each shipment as it is mailed.

It is very important to be quite precise when establishing your order requirements. Do you really want all of their issues, including souvenier sheets, booklets, presentation packs, first day covers, definitives as well as

commemoratives, special issues, postage dues, reprints, or postal tax stamps? Always check a recent catalog to become aware of the types of issues normally issued. Making returns of unwanted materials is almost impossible, but supplementary orders for other desired materials are usually simple.

Some bureaus send each issue immediately upon release while others make only periodic or even

annual shipments. If there are handling or mailing fees involved, bundling the issues can save a lot of money.

It is the fees involved that determine whether it is really feasible to buy issues directly. Many bureaus do not charge any fees at all and ship frequently. Some even frank the envelopes with plenty of stamps! Most bureaus however charge a modest fee or postage. A few include cancelled stamps equal in value to the fee paid in the shipment as a form of receipt.

Another source of fees are any bank charges associated with payments. In some countries the fees to process a check or a money order can be as much as \$20 per item. Never send cash as it almost always gets stolen somewhere along the line. Money orders

in US dollars are accepted by the majority of agencies. Credit cards are making the process much simpler and usually cheaper although some card issuers are now charging small fees to pay bills in foreign currencies.

Almost all shipments contain a lot of educational materials gratis. There will

normally be a brochure presented for each issue that explains the story behind the set as well as providing printing details, etc.

And each year I receive a variety of other philatelic items in the form of thank you gifts. Some agencies provide proofs, some specimen issues, some have special printings and every year I receive perhaps 50 philatelic themed Christmas cards. Several agencies send periodic magazines detailing

their issues and include general philatelic and tourism articles.

While rare, there are scams to be avoided. Several times I have received unsolicited letters from people claiming to be employees of the philatelic bureaus. The first starts out with a stated desire to simply be a pen pal but by no later than the third letter there develops a tale of woe accompanied by a request for money. The second involves a statement that the bureau is no longer going to accept payments in foreign currencies and that they would like to help by arranging a local money exchange and deposit which can be best accomplished by sending them personally a minimum of \$100 in cash.

One of the biggest expenses in the past was simply the postage involved in sending payments – currently a minimum of 80 cents even to send a \$25 money order (which I get free at my bank) or even to send the periodic new credit card numbers needed. Sending larger deposits to countries with a lot of issues reduces costs but also means committing a lot of funds to the accounts. Recently most agencies have allowed e-mail authorizations of credit card deposits.

office to sign for your mail, specify that your stamps not be sent by registered or insured mail. In all the years I have been doing this I have never had a lost shipment and the few that somehow got wet or otherwise damaged were replaced without hesitation.

At the risk of over generalizing, I still avoid dealing with developing or otherwise politically unstable countries. There are a few that refuse to use English and I can't find a neighbor to help translate. There are a couple that simply send too much junk no matter how many times I write to tell them I don't want their "special" issues. Some simply charge exorbitant handling fees. Some just kept my deposit and never sent anything! Those are the countries that I still buy through my new issue dealer.

tamp collecting is my main hobby, although I admit to being an inactive collector, and at the same time, an active correspondent (maybe I am really a writer?). I really enjoy helping others, particularly if it is to look for topicals, such as Dragons, Lighthouses, Entertainers, Chickens, Dogs, Trains, and so forth. I also enjoy emailing with many ISWSC members and others, and learning new and different things about stamps.

Model airplanes are my second hobby in importance, but my first actual hobby. It all started because my father was an airman in World War II, a gunner in light bombers, I heard a lot of flying stories, and I became interested in airplanes, and started building models. First, there were the solid models.

for aircraft identification, which did not fly, but just sat on a bookshelf, or hung from the ceiling.

They did allow me to start expressing my creativity, initially with assembly, but especially with the painting, including the artwork. Turns out that my father had some artistic talents (some of which were passed on to me), and had done some nose art on aircraft in his unit, which I did not know until many years after the war.

Then, model airplanes progressed to free flight, rubber powered, balsa stick and tissue models, which were quite

difficult to build at that age, and none flew very well, although I had some pretty good test glides from our attic window three floors up, to the back yard. As I got older, I went to control line, with gas engines, but always considered the models to be restricted, and really did not like the whole equipment requirement, the set up of using gas and castor oil, needing glow plugs and batteries, plus getting my fingers bruised when the engine started unexpectedly. And, you needed a relatively nice weather day to fly.

With college and the Army, hobbies went on the back burner, but, while stationed in Germany, I purchased many stamps of European countries, and frequently went to watch the radio control model airplane clubs. But, the radio equipment was heavy and very expensive, and, in my mind, that was not my hobby.

Years later, maybe as a combination of a mid-life crisis and cabin fever, I bought a radio control model, radio, engine, and all the accoutrements, joined a club, built the plane that winter, started to fly in the spring, and soloed in the late summer. I became good friends with a fellow engineer, who also went to our church. That chapter lasted many years, and I owned only two airplanes, the original trainer, and then a biplane, with a four stroke engine that sounded like, and flew like, a real old fashioned biplane. I was thrilled! However, after about ten years, my friend retired and moved, I became disenchanted, and sold off all my equipment. Back to stamps!

You can guess where this article is leading? My interest in model airplanes and stamps led to a small topical collection of model airplanes on stamps. Iron Curtain countries issued many during the Cold War, with sets showing how the Communist youths would develop from model airplanes to military training. I now have maybe 50-60 stamps depicting model

airplanes, a not very easy topical to find.

The primary part of my collection involves anything to do with aviation, including airmail, aircraft, balloons, historical figures associated with aviation, and a few First Flight covers. Then, would you believe that I have not yet attended the movie, "The Aviator"? I'm waiting for the video.

I do own some of the early USA airmails, but not the Zeps - never thought I wanted to pay for those! Greece issued a set of four as the first airmail issue. These stamps are larger than the USA airmails, and have the most delicate

pastel colors that I had ever seen! You really think the scenes were painted on location.

As sort of an answer to a trivia question, I found out that Great Britain has never issued an airmail stamp. Never would have guessed that, until I went looking for Great Britain airmails in the catalog.

Recently, a few adventures have happened that I thought I would like to write about, and request feedback from members. Most recently, a church member, named Kevin, said he had some art work of Duck Stamps, he would like to sell the art work, would I please help him, and he would make a donation of the proceeds to the church. Of course, I would! Kevin gave me the drawings and I contacted a few trusted local friends.

Turns out, so far, what I have appears to be two copies of the black and white pencil drawings for the 1947 Duck Stamp, one is signed by the artist, Jack Murray. All that information is contained in Scott's
