President Urges Members to Vote

It was nearly eight years ago that the first news article pertaining to the formation of a society for general collectors appeared. It has been slow --- but, I think solid. Officially, we have been an organization for only two years, although many have been "quasi" members for over five years. I sincerely hope you Charter members will continue your membership which runs out this month (January '86).

The enclosed white-ballot may seem innocuous, but please take the time to exercise your franchise. If you feel that your officers have been remiss, then register a NO vote (With your name underneath as a write-in, of course).

Now a few words --- the commercial --- in regards to the two questions on the ballot: The organization's name and the dues change. The original, and subsequently approved, bylaws omitted any organizational name. The words, to be decided, were written into Article I in place of a name. The name "Worldwide Collector's Club" was used as a provisional moniker until a name could be selected by the members in accordance with the bylaws. There are two other organizations currently using the present name. Additionally, we have had a recent influx of members representing every continent of the world! I would like to personally support "International Society of Worldwide Stamp Collectors" as our organization's name.

Briefly, the dues change reflects organizational costs. Officers have been paying costs of communications from their own pockets, which even with a dues increase, will continue. Postal costs for the newsletter subscriptions sent outside the U.S.; Canada and Mexico require a divided dues structure as in other organizations.

YOUR SUPPORT IS NEEDED. In compliance with Article VII, 60% (or more) of the FULL membership is required for approval of any bylaw change. Please, regardless of how you vote, **VOTE TODAY.** Thank you.

Vice President Reports on the Youth Stamp Program

The response of the membership to the request for additional stamps for the youth clubs project has really been super. Those extra ones combined with the membership renewals have really put us in good shape. I now have approximately ten pounds again and am ready for another media blitz to get us back in the collector limelight. In the past six months I have sent out about nine pounds to twelve different parties including about one-half of that amount to Jim Wolfard who is the San Diego area coordinator for the Ben Franklin Clubs. He reports they have over 300 clubs with 10,000 members. It would appear that collectors in southern California are doing their share of promoting stamp collecting among our youth!

Another person who is certainly doing more than her share is Ariel Poling (#76) of Bedford, Indiana. She reports she is currently working with four groups of youngsters, and in addition she has written an article on how to start a stamp club. I now have copies of this article available for anyone requesting such information from me. Isn't it great having such an active group of collectors who don't concentrate on flyspecks.

Now if we could just get someone to come forward and get an auction and/or sales circuit going. I believe that we have many members who would like to just buy or just sell stamps and do not necessarily have sufficient duplicates of a quality to enable them to participate in our Omni Exchange. Kudos must also go to Hal Clarke and Tom Allison for the job they are doing. The quality of the exchange material is constantly increasing. I am quite pleased with the books that Hal is mailing me on a regular basis.

There are a number of the "Freebie" circuits going around. I have received several and found a few stamps that I needed. If we all would include a short informal note as we send it on, it will help with getting members acquainted.

Lastly, this issue, I must extend thanks to Dick Edwards for the outstanding job he has done as our editor the last year, and let's hope he returns for another "tour".

Here's hoping you all had a very nice holiday season, and whether it was Happy Hanukkah, Feliz Navidad, or Merry Christmas the meaning was the same!

Worldwide Collectors Focus of New Column

The weekly philatelic publication Stamp Collector has initiated a new series of columns devoted to collecting stamps worldwide. The column, entitled "Round the World with Stamps", which made its debut in the 11 January 1986 issue, is being written by WWCC member, Micheal G. Morrill (#90).

Mr. Morrill indicated in the column that he hopes to address some of the problems unique to the worldwide collector. He wants to dispel the negative attitude sometimes directed toward worldwide collectors as somehow inferior to the specialized collector. He gave a good account of the average worldwide collector as very knowledgeable, much involved in philatelic clubs, and a

MY COLLECTION

My stamp collection got started in 1938 when I was ten. I sent away for stamps with Planter's Peanuts wrappers. I got my first album at a store in Dubuque, Iowa, that was giving them away free with a purchase of some kind of dairy product. I collected stamps through high school and college, finally working up to a Scott's International Junior Album. Marriage and four children left me too busy for much else, but I kept my stamps and Scott's International Jr. Album through our many moves.

In 1969 our house had a fire and my album was badly damaged but I was able to salvage many of the stamps. About this time I found myself with a family and myself to support. Luckily I was able to get hired as a clerk in the post office and later became Postmaster here in Gratiot, Wisconsin. Working with stamps all day soon made me remember the stamps stored away long ago.

It wasn't long before I was collecting full steam ahead. I collect U.S. stamps, Russian and related areas (up to 1940) and worldwide, of course. I tried to concentrate on U.S. and the Russian area but missed the fun of general collecting. When I read in Linn's about WWCC starting up, I knew this was for me.

I wish I had more time for my collection and for WWCC. Therefore I look forward to retirement in five years when I will have lots of time (I hope). I have a large backlog of stamps to mount and boxes to sort and soak. I do miss my old Scott's International Jr. Album but it's out of print now. It is difficult to find an album that is comprehensive enough without being so costly.

I have done some trading through the mail and just now I have a nice trading partner from Vancouver, Canada. Trading stamp for stamp is the most fun I think. However, time is my problem at present.

I belong to the APS and get sales circuits. They are great for

getting that single stamp to finish out a set. Four years ago I went to State College, Pa., to attend the APS Summer Seminar at Penn State University. I found this very worthwhile and really great fun. I recommend it for any collector who is able to spare a week and able to sleep on a thin dormitory mattress.

As a suggestion, I would encourage WWCC members to get a simple loose-leaf notebook and punch holes in the WWCC newsletters. This keeps them in order and in one place.

Letters to the Editor:

This is my first input to the WWCC other than my initial joining. I apologize for the long delay, but I'm afraid I'm also a member of the procrastinator's club. I figure it had better be now or never, because I changed my address more than a year ago and while the USPS has been good about forwarding my mail, they won't do it forever.

I am a member of a number of "Circuit Clubs" all over the world and have through them found a lot of foreign trading partners. These clubs operate in the following manner: To join, you send your name, address, your trading preferences, and a small membership fee (From \$1 to \$5, which may usually be paid in mint stamps or often a couple hundred large used stamps). In return, they send you names and addresses of other collectors with your interests and your name to still others, and the exchanges go from there. After the initial trades are completed, you return a report to the club, along with a minimum renewal fee (as low as 10 used commmeratives in one case, rarely more than \$1 in mint stamps) for more.

I have membership applications for many of these circuit clubs and would be willing to furnish them to any WWCC member interested in joining for a SASE. The clubs are headquartered in various countries, among them Finland, Sweden, Turkey, Argentina, Chile, Italy, Spain, Malta, Iraq, Japan, Brazil and others, but all use English as the basic language.

Some time ago, there was a question about changing our organization's name to avoid conflict with a similarly yclept (look that up in your Funk & Wagnall!) club in England. Well, I was a member of that club and I am sorry to report that it expired about the same time ours was starting up. The driving force behind that club from its inception was a young lady in Manchester named Sheila Morecroft. When she was

forced by illness and the demands on her time by returning to university for an advanced degree, she turned the administrative responsibility, including the club funds, records and even the duplicating machine over to a man named Arthur Dingley. Although he was highly recommended and promised to carry on the work promptly, as far as I know he has not been heard from since. So I would surmise that we would not have any difficulty by retaining our present name.

Soaker's Tip

Mike Sivak (#123) sent along this tip for the collector with just a few stamps to dry. They can be quickly dried in your microwave oven. Mike recommended drying them on high for about 3 minutes.

*** However, I found that in my microwave, using the high setting the stamps were completely dry in just about a minute. So experiment using a shorter time or lower temperature setting until you know how your microwave performs. I suspect it has something to do with the wattage (or power) of your particular oven. *** Editor

I tend to feel after reading Ray Compton's letter in this issue about the demise of the other club with the same name as ours, that it might be best to change our name just to preclude any connection in a potential member's mind with the unfortunate circumstances of its demise. I agree with President Aubrey Dunne's choice of the International Society of Worldwide Stamp Collectors (ISWSC).

Dues are due — for Charter Members (#1 - 78). If your dues aren't paid by April 1, 1986, this will be your last newsletter.

We owe thanks to our members who are promoting worldwide collecting and philately in general. Eugene Swonger (#86), in a letter to *Stamp Collector* (18 Jan 86) related his experience of trying to attend a stamp club meeting while on a trip, only to have no one, not even a club officer, show up at the meeting place. He admonished stamp club officers to take their duties seriously. He also put in a plug with dealers not to overlook the general worldwide collector. Let's all resolve to do more letter and/or article writing to

promote stamp collecting.

Speaking of dealers — we have two display and two classified ads in this issue. These ads help pay for the newsletter printing; so please patronize these dealers who are supporting our organization. Let them know you saw their ads in the WWCC newsletter.

In December *Linn's Stamp News* offered a 96-page booklet, "Stamp Collecting Made Easy" compiled from their weekly series of the same name. Linn's planned the booklet to help newcomers understand the terminology and techniques of our hobby and promote philately. Because extensive illustration is used along with the text, even the more obscure terms such as roulette, tete breche, etc. can be quickly and clearly understood by the beginner. I donated 25 copies to the WWCC Youth Program, requesting that at least one booklet go out with each stamp shipment. A single copy is \$1.00, but in larger quantities Linn's have reduced the price to 10 for \$5.00 or 25 for \$9.00 postpaid. At those prices, you could see that each youngster in your local stamp club gets a "free" copy. (Write: Stamp Collecting Made Easy, c/o Linn's, Box 29, Sidney, Ohio 45365)

For those of you who don't have a computer to make your own lists of the WWCC membership roster, should find the alphabetized computer listing offered by Tom Ginsberg well worth the price of a SASE plus a 22¢ stamp for the thermal paper costs. I've used it many times while preparing this newsletter.

I'm pleased to know there are other computerphiles in the WWCC. I am using an Apple Macintosh computer and the LaserWriter printer to produce this newsletter. There's no messy paste-ups with that goopy rubber cement; everything, including the illustrations, are done on the computer. In future issues, I plan to include a few articles on how the use of a computer can enhance your stamp collecting hobby; due to the length of the ballot there wasn't room for as much as I'd planned in this issue. (P.S.: I'd love to receive some review articles on stamp collection inventory software.)

As the WWCC newsletter editor last year, Dick Edwards set a fine example for me to follow and I only hope I can do as well for the membership as Dick did. Thank you for your fine efforts, Dick.
