

#### President's Message Election Results

I apologize for the delay of this issue of *The Circuit*, so as to include any election results, and the implications they might have. First, all measures passed overwhelmingly. Of immediate concern is the dues measure which increased the dues to \$5.00 (plus 250 different stamps) annually. This becomes effective April 1st (1987).

The Board of Directors has been expanded to a maximum of nine voting members, which is to include immediate past officers, plus appointed members to serve concurrently with elected officers. If you are interested in becoming an appointee, please let your elected officers know. The Public Relations Officer will be appointed rather than elected. The office will be in charge of elections and election procedures, effective January 1, 1988. In the future, any changes to the bylaws (revisions or additions) will require a 75% vote of all those balloting. Positions of Public Relations Officer and Editor will be appointed or confirmed by the Board of Directors, who also may appoint the Director of the Stamp Exchange as well as Sales Circuit and Mail Auction Managers, etc. Decisions by the Board of Directors may be overturned by a simple majority of the full membership upon request to the Public Relations Officer by a 10% petition of the membership, which would place the measure on the ballot.

And finally, the choice of the LOGO for ISWSC was Logo # 3.



I hope these changes will give greater flexibility to your Board of Directors to better serve the membership. I wish to personally thank all those who responded to the post card appeal - and to all of you - for taking part in this election.

These are sent along to those requesting stamps and information, along with Ariel Poling's article on "One Way to Organize a Junior

Stamp Club."

A note to those of you sending me stamps. I have been receiving some envelopes of stamps with postage due. It seems that there is a thickness criteria at USPS as well as weight. (Thanks for the info, Ken. Bet alot of members didn't know about this "rule.")

I have had a number of questions concerning what types, countries, and etc. of stamps we want to receive as the required part of ISWSC dues. Rather than respond to each individually (which I don't have the time or money to do), I'll try to answer these questions from time to time in this column. Any country is acceptable, but please don't send me 100, 200 or more of one kind of stamp as some have done. Please make it a maximum of ten of a kind, and remember, the requirement is 250 different. Upon receipt, I put all stamps in a large bag or box and mix them up, but 100 of the same kind tend to stick together and one group may recieve 20, 30 or more copies of Queen Elizabeth or President Eisenhower.

The stamps sales circuit is now in business and Roger Bergeson (#132) has books available right now for you to make selections from or blank books in which to mount your duplicates for sale.

And one last item, Kudos to Rita Kallal for her year of service as editor of *The Circit* and her willingness to continue as publisher.

#### Secretary-Treasurer's Report for January -March 1987

First, I thank all the members who mailed in their ballots from the last newsletter. Enough voted so we won't have that problem again. Aubrey is giving you the results elsewhere in this issue.

We have just enrolled member # 276. After dropping those members who failed to renew we now have 228 paid up members and our treasury balance is \$727.87.

The following members are dropped for non-payment of dues: #91, 93, 94, 95, 96, 100, 111, 112, 113, 115, 118, 119, 124, 125, 127, 128, 135, 136 and 139.

The Club is sorry to report the resignation, due to ill health, of Julia Dailey #174. We wish her the very best.

Now a long overdue note of explanation. The club was officially formed in April 1984 with 78 Charter members who had indicated a willingness to our founder, Aubrey Dunne (#1) to support such an activity. While the sequence of their response to Aubrey's appeal is shown by their membership number, they all have the same initial date (arbitrarily) as their actual membership did not start until that month (April 1984) and dues, for example, became due two years later. Their original application forms were not dated. Since then I have dated all memberships.

One other point that has confused many. Our dues have, since inception, been \$6.00 plus 250 stamps for a 2 year membership. Beginning April 1, 1987, dues will be \$5.00 plus 250 stamps for a 1 year membership. Of course, those paid in advance are covered and those paying for more than one year in the future are "insured" against any future dues raises for the period covered. (Remember: The new dues rate becomes effective April 1, 1987.)

Some members are concerned by the 250 stamp donation part of the dues. As you know, these are provided to young collector groups to encourage their interest in our hobby. They can be mint, used, or CTO (Cancelled-to-Order). The term "different" was used to imply: "Don't send 250 used US 22¢ Flag over Capital." or "Don't send a full sheet of foreign one centavo definitives.", etc. It is certainly not meant as a bind on any member who does his or her best with the end view of helping youngsters in mind. The end objective is to help the youngsters have as many different stamps as possible and to spark their interest in stamp collecting; so send as many different as you possibly can, but a few duplicates are okay.

Next, some miscellaneous administrative items:

a. Please <u>don't</u> send stamp donations for the club to Herb. It costs the club money to send these on to Ken. An unnecessary step and expense.

b. Marion Poole (# 33) has discontinued the exchange she was running. How about you ex-members joining our Omni Exchange. (Write Hal # 47 or Tom # 42.)

- c. It's always the high point of my day when the mail comes. The nice stamps used by many, the interesting stickers and rubber stamps, sometimes cachets, and once in awhile, a real eye-catcher. Like, for instance, a cover from Joellen Lee (# 104). The return address stamp said, "Center of the Known Universe"-- Philomath, Oregon! And here all along I've thought it was New Braunfels, Texas!!
- d. Please all note that Esther Fraats (# 75) has two addresses: a summer one in Susquehanna, PA and a winter one in Naples, FL.

e. Futrell (#2) and Edwards (#117) are unable to trade with other members at the present time, but expect to be able to later.

f. All roster and membership changes have been incorporated into the new roster included with this issue of *The Circuit*. The plan now is to provide one to each member annually on renewal of membership plus updates in each newsletter. With the new dues rate we can afford this now. And by the way -- if you want six newsletters a year instead of four, write and tell your editor so



### **Other Collectors' Letters Spark Memories of Childhood Discovery**

I enjoy reading the collector letters on how they got started. I sure remember the excitement when I got my first stamps. I was in the 7th grade some 42 years ago. My folks had bought a summer resort and the boy that had lived there left a box of toys and in that was a little worldwide album with stamps mounted and loose --- also a copy of Ivanhoe. Didn't take long to find out there was a stamp store in town and the babysitting money was spent on stamps and books. Later I sold that one (although not too long ago I found some of my grandmother's old letters from Sweden with no stamps---just a hole in the envelope.)

In 1956 my boss started giving me his stamp papers and the stamp shop was on my walk home from work. That started the second worldwide collection. This time I listened to all the stamp paper advice on how you should specialize and when my husband was moved more in the military, I got rid of several albums. He retired, and by that time I was back from saving just British and back to a third worldwide collection, looking for used stamps this time.

Now I save money until I have enough to get an old collection and have my fun cataloging and adding to mine, and then exchanging through clubs and selling lots so I can get enough money to buy another one.

I told my husband I'd like to be a stamp approval dealer as I like to work with stamps so much. He just said, "You'd never make it. If you got ahold of a stamp you hadn't seen, you'd have to save it." I'll just say, "Maybe, someday......

#### Does Idea for New Column Interest Members?

Quite sometime ago I submitted an idea for a column to appear in *The Circuit* regularly. It was met with silence. After a recent conversation with Vice President Ken Jenkins (#15), he suggested just such a column might be a good addition to the newsletter, so I have revived my idea of a "What'zit?" column. On occasion we all come across an item or two that we don't know about nor can we find the answer in our catalogs or philatelic literature at hand. My idea is for members to submit good photocopies of such puzzling items to the newsletter for other members to help figure out what they are.

The column could also help members with answers to other collecting problems. One such problem that I would like some

answers to is how to get rid of the glue on some of the older used stamps from such countries as Austria, Romania, etc. The glue becomes softish when soaked, but doesn't wash off as most glues do. It seems the only way to get it off is to rub it off with one's fingers, but I have found this to be a dangerous practice because some of the stamps will fall apart due to age or the softening of the paper from being waterlogged during soaking. I know it is possible to remove the glue, as I have come across the very same stamps without a trace of glue on the back. So my question is .... What'zit take to get rid of this glue?

Let the editor know if you are interested in such a column appearing in the newsletter, either by sending an item or question or just a postcard saying you like the idea. All answers to questions and puzzling items would be printed in the newsletter to benefit all members' knowledge.
