President's Message

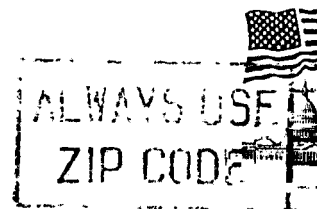

Worldwide Collectors May Opt For Solitude

Since this column first appeared, I have received a heavy volume of mail. One thing that is quite apparent from reader comments is that worldwide collecting has not diminished to nearly the level I had been led to believe from reading the philatelic press. However, it is also apparent that many worldwide collectors have opted for collecting in solitude rather than be active members of the philatelic community.

For various reasons, many collectors have decided not to join clubs, exhibit their collections, or participate in the many hobby promotion activities currently being stressed. I have given this situation considerable thought, examining both the collector's reasons and the possible effect on the hobby.

For many years, I too, was a solitary collector. My military career necessitated my moving often enough so that holding club office and being active in group activities requiring long term commitment seemed impractical. At least those were the rationalizations I used. In reality, I just didn't want any more social responsibilities. I think many worldwide collectors share those feelings.

Family, career, church, and fraternal associations all lay claim to an individual's time and emotional reserves. During that period when we are building our family, developing a career, and becoming constructive members of our respective communities there is a tremendous drain on our energies. We have to share so much of ourselves that I feel it natural that many of us decide to keep our hobby private and unfettered by outside attachments.

For these same reasons I experience mixed emotions when I read about the many efforts to get youngsters involved in stamp collecting. Although it is probably true that kids form the base for future philatelic generations, I break into a near sweat when I picture children anywhere near my collection. Its orderly peacefulness would be shattered by their frantic, uncontrolled movements.

Single Bliss

I find nothing wrong with an individual's desire to be a solitary collector. One does not have to be the local "spark-plug" to enjoy the hobby. It is quite possible to enjoy philately without ever coming in contact with another collector. In fact, there are many pluses that perhaps override the minuses.

As a solitary collector, one can set whatever standards of condition, scope of interest, or time commitment one desires. There is no pressure to deviate from philatelic paths you deem important.

As a solitary collector, you do not have to compete with other collectors' views, and what little time you have allotted to enjoy the hobby will not be consumed in non-hobby activities. You don't have to travel to meetings, you don't have to prepare exhibits, nor do you have to become involved in club politics.

There will be no hassle over preparations of organizational charters or deciding who is responsible for what duties. More important, you won't feel obligated to volunteer for all those chores you really don't want to do.

It is quite possible for the solitary collector to make all of his philatelic purchases by mail. There is practically nothing a collector needs that isn't offered by mail order dealers. In many cases, mail order is the most cost-effective method of purchase. It is not necessary to mingle with other collectors to obtain supplies.

Perhaps it is more common for the worldwide collector to proceed in solitude than it is for the specialist. Since the worldwide collector has such a wide scope of interest there is no shortage of sources for obtaining material. Rattle Snake Island local stamps have a limited number of suppliers, but nearly any dealer or collector will have something of interest to the worldwide philatelist.

Exhibits Impractical

In addition; there isn't the competition among worldwide collectors that there is among specialized collectors. It is difficult to exhibit a worldwide collection. Since collections are no longer

judged in their entirety but rather by what can be placed in several frames, there really isn't any place to show a worldwide collection.

To my knowledge, there are no guidelines for exhibiting worldwide collections. Few, if any, philatelic judges would consider themselves qualified to pass judgement on such a collection.

I have never read of a worldwide collection being exhibited in any of the modern stamp shows. With all of the coverage in the philatelic press concerning CAPEX '87, I have yet to see mention of plans for exhibiting a worldwide collection.

It is only natural therefore, for worldwide collectors to feel out of the mainstream of philatelic activity. I don't think this particularly bothers most worldwide collectors, particularly those who collect in solitude.

If the philatelic community wishes to draw these solitary collectors into the open, then several steps will have to be taken. Show organizers will have to devise ways of integrating worldwide collections into their exhibition. The philatelic community will have to devise standards by which worldwide collections can be judged, and judges will have to develop necessary qualifications to determine the merits of such collections. Perhaps a return to the old "bin" method of exhibiting is a partial answer.

Regardless of the philatelic community's efforts to draw solitary collectors into a more active, public role, many worldwide collectors will choose to remain outside organized philately. They enjoy their method of collecting and will see no reason to change. It is true that they will miss many of the benefits of joint effort but also will continue to avoid the drawbacks.

Despite their isolation, solitary collectors do contribute to the well-being of the hobby. In addition to their financial contribution, they are building collections that will eventually become available to the general philatelic community. Many possible philatelic finds will eventually surface. They are preserving material for future generations.

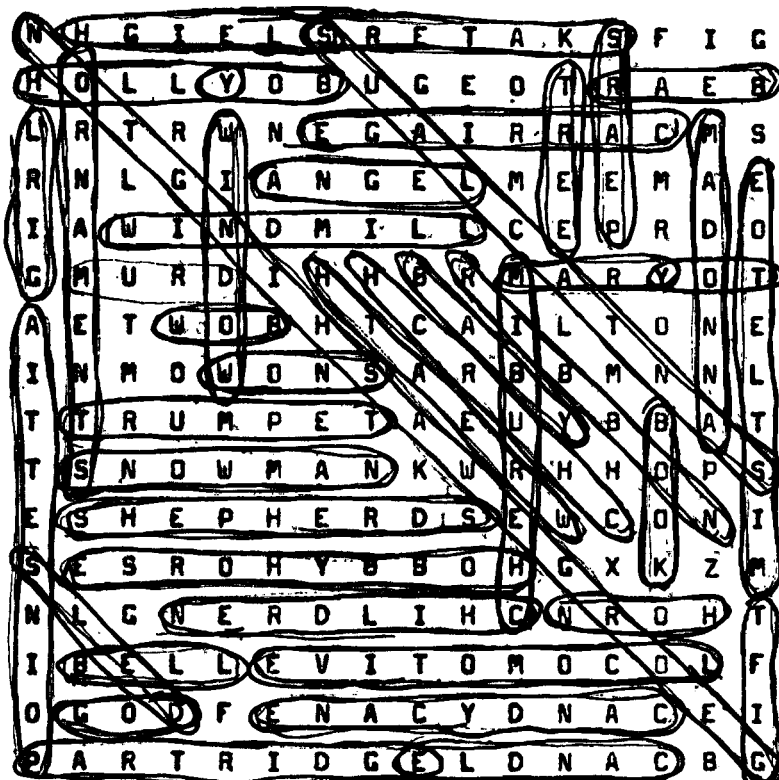
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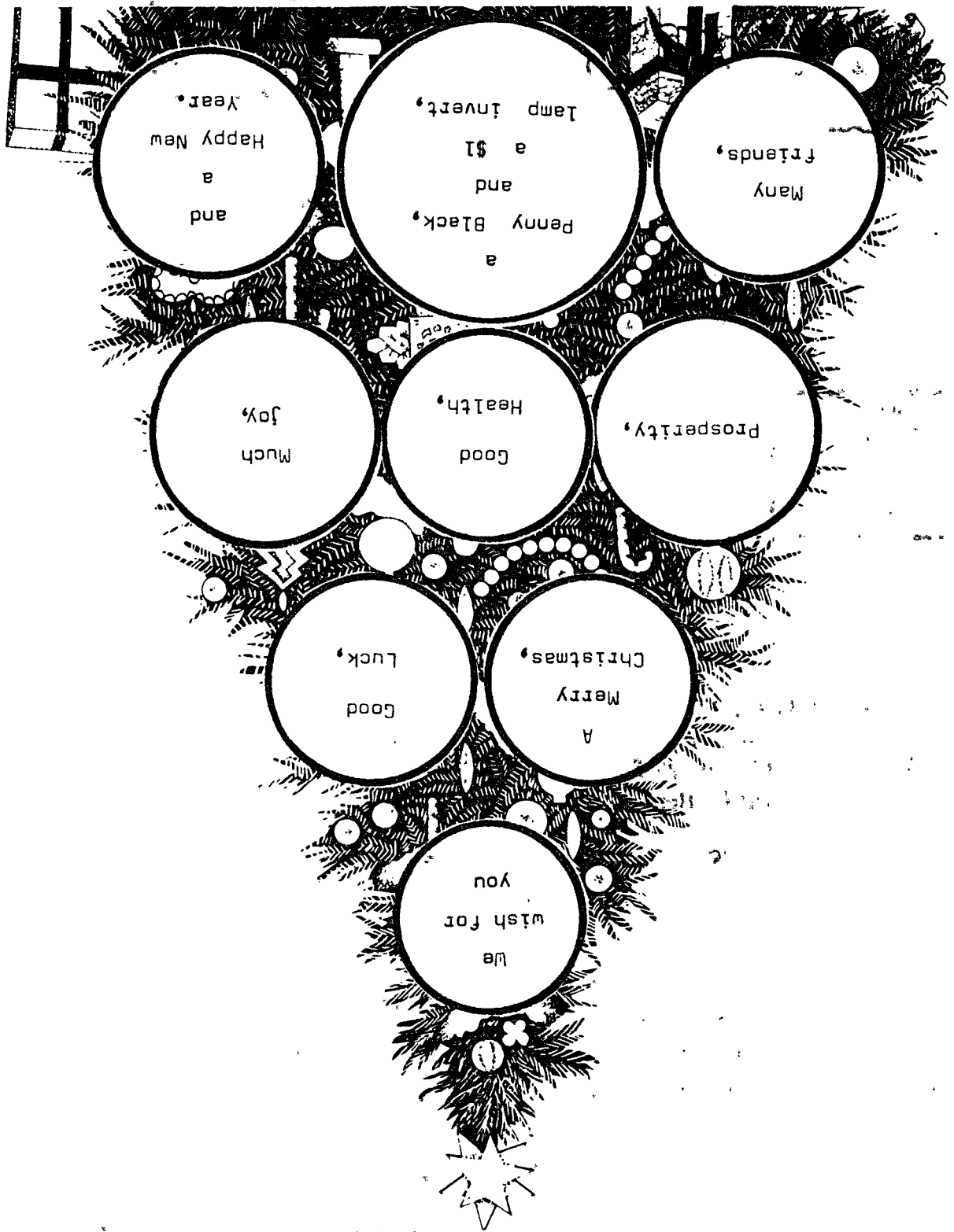
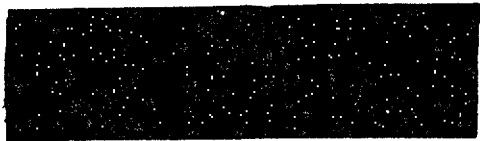
