

Definitives are Special to Aussie Member

Here in Brisbane, Australia, EXPO '88 will end in a few days time. As a world collector, it was almost like renewing old friendships as I visited the various pavilions. Of course, some of my countries were unable to be present, having long ago disappeared off the map.

What in reality, constitutes a "world collector"? It is my contention that in these days when it is impossible to keep up with new issues from all over the world, one must apply certain limits. I don't think, anybody can seriously collect stamps from all over the world without some kind of system and organisation. For example, one of my friends collects the entire world but applies 1960 as the limit for his interest. Because he has been at it for around 50 years he has amassed a sizeable collection.

My interests are confined mainly to definitive (some call them regular) issues, but I still have some remnants which I have continued since deciding to collect only these. After many years, one becomes attached to a collection of New Zealand, South Africa, USA, etc., and as I am kept up to date by correspondents in those countries, I would lose those pen-friends if I gave up collecting their country's stamps.

Perhaps the most fascinating part of my collection is that covering Europe and by concentrating on definitive issues, it becomes a possibility to collect all of that continent's stamps. No other continent has changed so much due to wars and other conflicts, so it is like an iceberg with the current and obvious part open to view, while the remainder is buried as "dead" countries and states.

Definitives (Cont'd)

During recent months I have used my Europe collection as the subject when asked to be a guest speaker. I purchased an excellent map of Europe, so I take this along and spread it on the table. Where the membership is not too large, I invite everybody to sit around the table while I take them on a tour covering all of Europe from Scandinavia to the Balkan Peninsula.

By introducing historical comments showing for example, why early stamps from Finland resemble those of Russia, and philatelic comment such as the multiplicity of perforations on some early Austrian stamps, the talk usually goes down very well. Somebody is already asking how I store this huge amount of stamps which are generally of low value.

This is where I preach one of my firm convictions about our hobby. Everybody should feel free to implement their own ideas and I have done exactly that. I use ordinary foolscap size notepaper which I purchase by the ream (500 sheets) at the local chain-store for about \$6. Then I house the sheets, so many at a time in ring-binders from the same store at about \$2 each. The holes need "ring re-inforcements" to prevent tearing. Then we are ready to mount, normally used stamps using hinges.

I can write introductory notes at the beginning of each country, such as the currency, date of first issue and anything that seems worth recording for use at a later date. (In a talk for instance.) Pages can be changed, substituted or added at any time. I have divided Europe into sections, such as Scandinavia, Austria-Hungary, Balkan Peninsula, etc. The collection now covers seven sections.

Currently, I am concentrating on Yugoslavia. which came into existance at the end of World War I. This can be divided into several sections and I start with the stamps of the countries which went to make up Yugoslavia, such as Serbia, Montenegro, Bosnia etc. Austrian and Hungarian stamps postmarked at appropriate places can be added. During World War II there were various changes made with stamps issued by independent Croatia, Serbia, etc. Then there are occupied by German, Italian and Yugoslav forces, all of which I include as being part of a geographical area. Finally, it all settled down and a return can be made to the more recent stamps.

There are the numerous tiny areas such as Schlesvig and Carinthia where stamps were issued only over the period of a few months, as well as the major countries, all of which add up to a very interesting study. Of course, you will need to have a slight yearn to study the history of Europe to give you a better understanding of the subject.

The great thing about collecting in this manner is not having to be concerned about new issues. Definitive stamps are more common and usually turn up sooner or later, with the added bonus to somebody like myself of being available at little or no cost. Then, when I visit a stamp club, I can nearly always pick up something to add to my collection.

I don't meet too many world collectors in Australia; there could be a lot more when you stop to realise it is as large in area as the USA. However, most people learning of my addiction to collecting the world, usually ask "How on earth do you get the time for it?" My reply usually follows the same theme—The purpose of having a hobby is so that all one's spare time can be devoted to it.




that pen and paper and putting into words that thought you have had for so long. If you enjoy reading what others have written, just think—we will enjoy what you write, too!
