300 Pen Pals—But Not All at Once!

Lydia Cohn's son started writing to people abroad when he was in elementary school but lost interest when he entered junior high. She took it up with zest. That was 15 years ago.

Since then, Lydia has built up quite a network of post box buddies, some of whom have become close friends.

She has corresponded with more than 300 persons and currently exchanges letters with about 35. They include residents of Communist countries but, not wishing to make trouble for them, nothing political goes into the letters. However, she and a fellow in England often wrote about politics until he died recently.

She is able to give her correspondents a picture of America they can't get otherwise. In return, she gets more than a postcard view of what life is like in other countries.

Her postage bill is about \$15 a week, plus mint stamps she buys for her pen pals. Her list of swaps, and just plain gifts, both given and received, includes many other items besides stamps. Bells with the names of places on them. Postmarks. View cards. Even Detroit Lions souvenirs.

Her hobby has resulted in a massive collection including stamps, postmarks and view cards. She keeps them all, stored in plastic containers, lined up in rows on her bookcase.

"People are people," she concluded as a result of her marathon letterwriting. "People are the same all over the world. They want the same things. They want a job. They want a good education for their children."

Lydia's major collecting interest before she got into stamps and letterwriting was postmarks. She has a surplus of postage meter cancels and would like to trade with anyone who collects these, or will send some free in return for postage. Now for a little more "philosophy." In the March-April issue I said that, in my opinion, *The Circuit* should contain articles that advance worldwide collect-

ing and that if people want articles on specialized subjects there are other pubs, such *The American Philatelist*, for that purpose. In the last issue I reported that only one member, #189 Burt, had commented, and that was favorable. Since then I have received two more letters on the subject, one pro and one con.

First, the con from Shultz #303. He states: "... Although not every member would be interested in an article on the Airmail Errors of Lower Slobbovia, such an article would serve two useful purposes. First, it would remove some of the pressure from ye Editor to fill said newsletter as she has been clamoring for material for our membership to peruse. Secondly, a true worldwide collection is truly impossible because of both space and cost. The Michel survey of 1987 new issues alone carried a price tag of almost \$20,000. Therefore, I feel the majority of us must limit our collections in some way and consequently will form a specialty or two unless we wish our general collection to stagnate. So, therefore, an article on the "Slobbovian" stamps could gain new collectors on the one hand and add knowledge to those who already collect, on the other."

Now the pro from Howard #129. He writes: "I absolutely agree with you on 'flyspeck' philately.' Such articles abound in virtually all other phil. pubs. and this is not what I am looking for in-The Circuit. I have very much enjoyed the articles by various members describing their collecting habits and giving their reasons for-doing-whatever they do. The article by Jan Sheetrum is now my favoritě; her philosophy of working with what you have and considering your glass half full rather than half empty is a marvelous way of collecting. These types of articles are unique to The Circuit (as far as I know) and I think that we should continue to encourage members to write. One of these days I intend to submit an article myself."

On another subject, Dave Howard goes on to say: "With regard to ads, I enjoy them and wish there were more. One member put in an ad for general foreign at 50% of cat. and then

complained because of no response. Two points: a) I expect bargains to be offered by collectors or vest pocket dealers and b) 50% of cat. for most general foreign went out years ago. Where's he been?"

Great! Now let's have some more comments on what I said, and some comments on the comments. I love it!

New membership contest: From now on, any member who gets five new members to join in any 12-month period gets one year's free dues! Let's hit it!

Scott Begins Second Year of Turmoil

Buying and selling of stamps is rather listless and the new Scott Catalogs are getting most of the blame. Scott began the process of lower prices in the 1989 Vol. 1 and upset thousands of collectors and dealers because the lower prices mostly affected what had always been regarded as quality stamps while not touching the "wallpaper" issues.

Last year's Vol. 1 appeared with no advance publicity to educate the public as to what Scott was trying to do. In fact, when called to task about it, Scott denied any intention of going to a net price policy. With the advent of the 1990 catalogs, the firm declares just the opposite—that catalog prices are what the collector can expect to pay for stamps in the condition listed.

There is no way Scott can keep up with the stamp market. The catalog values are out of date by the time the books are delivered. It is for that reason that many collectors buy cat-

New Editor Already Seeking Relief

As the new editor of *The Circuit*, I have to take a long, hard look at what I'm doing. And I have to conclude that I must be irrational.

Last month, I observed my 72nd birthday. As the end of the month approached, I had to give up a couple of days on the golf course to prepare copy for my monthly golf paper, for which I am editor, rewrite man, headline writer, photographer, typesetter, makeup man, and mailer. alogs only every second or third year, using them for reference on everything except price.

Scott's policies may result in the growth of subscriptions to philatelic periodicals, which have been declining for most of the last decade. It is only by studying dealer prices on a current basis that anyone can determine the value of anything. Stamp Collector's publisher, Jim Magruder, advises: "Focus on the market, not the catalog." The same paper's Market Observations column says:

"The 1990 Scott Catalog has arrived. Volume 1 has been issued and is purported to be a net price catalog. Don't you believe it! In my opinion this book will be more useful as a doorstop than as a guide to valuing a stamp collection. Many items have been cut by 20% to 60%, although some have not changed and some have gon up.

"There are more inaccuracies than ever before. Any dealer who charges full 1990 Scott is being very unfair to his customers. There are plenty of items that are worth full catalog, but there are plenty that should sell for much less."

Think of what this is doing to exchange clubs and society circuits!

But if you need a philatelic reference book, and a listing of fairly recent issues, you need the Scott Catalog. After all, it's the only game in town, except for dealer price lists.

Aussies Paying \$45 For Scott Catalog

An Australian stamp dealer air-freighted 20 copies of the Scott Stamp Catalog Vol. 1 and offered them to his customers at \$60 Australian (about \$45 U.S.) plus postage. They'll really have something to complain about—many of the better Australian stamps are priced at less than current retail values, according to another dealer.

A recent issue of *Linn's Stamp News*, owned by the publishers of the catalog, had many letters and articles pointing out errors and inadequacies in the catalog.

Editor-in-chief of the Scott Catalog is Richard Sine, former editor of *The American Philatelist*. Instead of firing Sine, Scott will probably raise his pay. The turmoil over the new edition is establishing new records for catalog sales!

Some Ducks Neither Postage nor Revenue

If you collect the stamps of Russia, or if you collect duck stamps, you should be aware that the recent much-publicized duck stamps of Russia are not postage stamps and have no postal validity whatever. Neither are they revenue stamps, like American duck stamps. They are charity labels issued to raise funds for wetlands preservation.

A recent Canadian duck stamp, too, is neither a postage nor a revenue stamp. The \$6.50 conservation stamp is issued by a non-profit foundation, not the Canadian government.

Australia will issue its first duck stamp in August. The \$5 stamp, which has nothing to do with duck hunting, will be used to validate entry passes to Kakadu National Park in the Northern Territory of Australia.

Israel has issued a set of four stamps, se tenant, featuring ducks of the Holy Land.

You CAN Collect the Whole World!

By JAMES BURT (#189)

It has been said too many times that no one can collect worldwide stamps any more because there's just too many countries and too many stamps. The statement is true only if you think you have to fill every space in your album.

There are many ways to collect—almost as many ways as there are collectors. If you must complete a country, or include specialist material not listed in the standard catalog, obviously you are going to wind up with some pretty high-priced material. You may not have the resources to spread to more than one country. That is one of the reasons so many collectors collect U.S. only.

On the other hand, you can limit your collecting to definitives only—commemoratives only—to stamps under a certain price limit—or only to stamps that appeal to you. I once thought I would label a binder "Stamps That I Like." I never got around to doing it, but it's still worth considering.

One of the best ideas I have heard is the way Ken Jenkins limits his collecting interests to the first hundred years. That enables him to include all the classics and eliminates much of the wallpaper printed just to sell to stamp collectors.

Another way to increase the area covered by your collecting interests is to spend less on accessories and supplies. The prices of albums have reached ridiculous extremes. Nobody in his right mind would start collecting now by purchasing a full set of Scott Internationals—and these albums are in the "moderate" price range. If you have the full set, chances are you wouldn't have bought your first one if you had known what your future investment in them would be.

You can go a long way with blank pages, expressing your artistic and/or creative talents by designing your own pages. You can leave out the stamps you don't like, or the ones that are too rich for your appetite. Or you can do it the easy way, using the clear-strip stockbook pages for inserting stamps without hinges or mounts. You can

rearrange them any time if you want to add more stamps.

There is more than one right way to do almost anything. Each of us is a unique individual with a different combination of talents, tastes and values. What's right for me may not appeal to you, but the reverse is true also. If we collect for pleasure and knowledge, spend no more than we would spend on entertainment, and our stamps have some salvage value when it's all over, that salvage value is 100% profit.

Short Stuff Wanted

More short items will ease the task of making up each issue of The Circuit. The editor would appreciate receiving short items of all kinds, so long as they are of general interest to worldwide collectors.

A quiz each month could be one. Anyone out there want to start the ball rolling with a 10-question quiz on monetary units of the world, and one on names of countries that have been changed in comparatively recent years? These should baffle anybody but worldwide collectors!

MEMBER HELPS BEN FRANKLIN CLUBS

(The following is excerpted from a letter written by Ariel Pohling (#76), describing Benjamin Franklin Stamp Club activities.)

I am very proud of our Benjamin Franklin Stamp Clubs since I have been solely responsible for their organization. I have been working with them over eight years and have indoctrinated many children in basic stamp collecting. This year we have 15 at Heltonville 3rd, 4th and 5th grades; we have 30 at Lincoln 3rd and 4th grades and we average 20-25 at the Library, adults as well as children.

We have four parents in the group—one father and son, one father with son and daughter and two mothers with a daughter each. And all of the parents are becoming quite interested in collecting since they started bringing the children to the monthly meetings. I'm sure that the arrival of any stamps for the club will be the talk of the town!

Heltonville is a county school 10 miles north and east of Bedford—it is a small community and the little post office is across the road from the school and the postmaster is quite interested in our club. The children made a poster about National Stamp Collecting Month which is hanging in the post office.

The principal at Lincoln collected as a child and is quite interested in maintaining a school club. He meets with us whenever possible. Incidentally, at both elementary schools the children give up their noon recess to go to the stamp club meetings and if they miss one meeting they are terminated—absence from school is the only legitimate excuse.

For the October meetings in all three clubs we are making first day covers for the Christmas stamps due out the last of the month. I am mailing this letter in one of the covers that has been partially prepared for a child to address and finish decorating. You wouldn't believe how pretty some of them are!

We will also make a page to mount the cover on and I will give them corners to put on the first day cover. I have a mockup-sheet for verification and then he or she will copy it on the envelope. This is a time-saver, which we need because we have only 45 minutes and some of these children are bused and some have different city addresses and zip codes.

Stamps Dropped From Survey

The New York investment firm of Salomon Brothers has for two decades published an annual report ranking the relative performance of compounded annual rates of return for 13 assets and the U.S. Consumer Price Index. Until now, the survey has included stamps as one of the assets.

The firm has announced that stamps were deleted this year because "the supplier of the information has changed its pricing policy." The reference apparently is to the muchtalked-about Scott Catalog pricing changes, a subject of much confusion to both dealers and collectors, to say nothing of non-collectors who might have considered investing in stamps because of their good record as an investment vehicle.

Comparison of 1989 catalog values for U.S. stamps with the "net-priced values" in the 1990 catalog give the alarming and highly misleading impres-

sion that prices had plummeted dramatically in the intervening year.

Maria Fiore, an analyst for Salomon Brothers, said it was unlikely stamps would soon be returned to the survey "unless the firm can get reliable information" on U.S. stamp prices going back to 1968-69.

The Salomon Brothers survey showed U.S. stamps with a compound rate of return of more than 20% in the inflationary 1970s, slowing to 2% annual growth rate in the deflationary '80s.

The investment angle is missing when foreign stamps are considered, which is just as well. Scott's pricing of U.S. stamps has never been regarded as reliable and is even more capricious on foreign stamps.

Ronald H. Wickens (#267) writes from Queensland, Australia:

"... As a magazine for worldwide collectors, I feel there is far too little mention being made of the reason for being. The main content seems to consist of 'club business.' I speak from experience as I am editor of a magazine distributed to all stamp clubs and societies in Queensland as well as to a number of private subscribers. Readers are provided with a balance of club business type information, articles covering local and world subjects and items discovered in other philatelic publications. The latter may be adapted, shortened, etc., and providing the source is quoted, there is never any complaint. I do not copy word for word unless for a special reason.

"In order to fill the magazine, I usually find myself writing up to 50% of the content or rewriting what somebody else has written as an article.

Anyway, I think you really need to find some interesting articles and stories from a source which covers the entire world..."

Ron has hit the nail squarely on the head. An editor cannot tell you anything he doesn't know. Those who write articles need to tell us *more* than we want to know—if we have the space, we can use all of it; if not, we can prune it to fit. And if we have the facts but the presentation is not quite right, we can straighten that out. But first and foremost, we have to have the information, "just the facts, ma'am," or we can do nothing.

Those of you who have something to share—knowledge, experience, wor whatever—just send us the facts and don't worry about the writing.

Stamp swapping has changed

Stamp clubs have come a long way from what they used to be. Members used to be able to swap because nearly everybody collected worldwide. (We're a minority in the philatelic world.)

Now, the great majority of collectors collect only U.S., or only a selected few foreign countries, or perhaps just topicals. How is one collector to trade with another?

Generally, they don't. Everybody becomes a vest pocket dealer. A sells something to B for cash because B has no stamps from the countries A collects. Then B takes the cash and buys something from C.

At least, that's the way it works in the Memphis Stamp Collectors Society. The only thing that cuts across all lines is the auction—a small one at each meeting, a couple of big ones each year. The 10% commission helps keep dues low.
