ONE OF 1989's OUTSTANDING STAMP DESIGNS

Without question, one of the candidates for best stamp design of '89 is Finland's Tribute to the Centennial of the Finnish Kennel Club. The souvenior sheet was issued March 17, 1989, and depicts four Finnish - bred dogs.

The upper left stamp shows a Lapponian Herder. This spitz dog is black with white markings and is especially popular with reindeer herders of the northlands.

The upper right stamp depicts a Finnish Spitz with its typical reddish-brown or reddish-yellow coat. They are friendly at-home pets, although they are traditionally hunting dogs by nature.

The lower left stamp is of a Karelian Bear dog. As its name suggests, these dogs were used to hunt bears.

The lower right stamp features a Finnish Hound. This hunting breed is the most common in Finland. Due to its high energy level, this dog prefers a country home.

The sheet was designed by Torsten Ekstrom. It was printed in four color process in a quantity of 125 million. This sheet will appeal to dog lovers and other animal topicalists, besides collectors of Finland and worldwide stamps.



ONCE IN A LIFETIME TRIP INCLUDES PHILATELIC ADVENTURES

During January this year I took a once in a lifetime "Ski and See" trip to Innsbruck, Austria. Due to the "Great Snow Drought," there was more seeing than skiing.

A day trip took us to Venice, Italy, where we fed the pigeons in Saint Mark's Square and rode in gondolas on the canals. I had time to take in a stamp store on the Square that was fabulous. I was able to purchase some additions to my collection. The dealer spoke limited English and I speak no Italian, but stamps are stamps in any language and a Visa Card is international money any place.

January 12th was the 500th anniversary of the postal service in Austria. In 1490 (two years before Columbus discovered America) the Counts of Thurn and Taxis established a private mail service in Innsbruck which later provided mail delivery to the old Holy Roman Empire. This lasted until after the defeat of Napolean and the unification of the small German states. This became the foundation of the Austrian postal service.

Austria, West Germany, and Belgium held a joint celebration and First Day Ceremony at Innsbruck. The event took place in an exhibition hall and conference center adjoining the Hofburg, the Habsburg Imperial palace. The royal family used the palace when they were in Innsbruck. Innsbruck is the capital of the Austrian state of Tirol. The Chief of State of Austria still makes use of the Hofburg when he is on state visits. The modern exhibition center is as modern as the palace is opulent.

- Unluckily for me, the after effects of a small drink of water in Venice the day before, made it impossible for me stand in the long lines to get stamps and cancellations, but I was able to view all the frames of the stamp show. I enjoyed this very much.

At the main entrance to the exhibit hall, there was a restored mail coach from the old Austro-Hungarian Empire. The old yellow mail coach makes frequent appearances in national events.

Before we left Innsbruck I was able to visit four stamp and coin shops. I did buy some nice postally used stamps, but mostly talked stamps.

I had hopes of getting some stamps on a one day stopover in Copenhagen, Denmark, on the return trip. However, stores close early on Saturday afternoon and remain closed until Monday A.M.

As wonderful as the trip was, the best part was coming through customs at O'Hara Airport in Chicago and heading for the regional bus back to Wisconsin and home. ••• Della L. Burmeister (# 97)

I traded stamps with him for years and he was a booster of hand drawn "entires," as any of you who ever traded with him knew. I salute him for his contribution to the "art" of stamp collecting. Since I worked in a print shop. I was able to send him boxes of paper, salvaged from the paper-cutter. Instead of throwing away good "cut-offs" I could send him fifty pounds of paper for the UPS charge of five dollars. If any of you ever saw his original art work using stamps, you can see how much good was achieved by a humble effort. It doesn't take a lot of money or time to share your love of stamps with your friends and fellow man. Thank you, and keep up the good work.

I would like to propose a topic for conversation: I collect and trade worldwide postage stamps, for which there is no lack of interest, but I also stretch that definition to include Revenues, my favorite being Mexican Revenues. I would like to turn you on to this little appreciated area of collecting. Many of the old issues list in the Steven's Catalogue for a few pennies each. They are beautiful and many are 100 years old. Mexico did not have an income tax, so they sold revenue stamps for just about every kind of business transaction, which paid for the government services, so there were a lot of them issued. Also they had to be saved for 5 years to prove the taxes were paid. I think that if more collectors knew about them, then we might see some lots at auction: I would like to communicate with anyone interested in more information or trades of this fine, fun material. I also know a new catalogue is in the making, as my mother (who has been collecting them for 50 years) has been collaborating with the author. Since no dealers I know of handle this item, it is up to us "civilians" to dig this stuff up. This not a big ticket item, so I do it for the pleasure alone. Try it, your might like it!

SALVAGING A MISSPENT CHILDHOOD

At present, I consider myself to be a very inactive collector. I started as a kid, about eight years old, as the result of a birthday present, and was avid for about eight more years. Then, through high school, college, the army, graduate school, jobs, travel, vacations, etc., I always accumulated items "for my retirement" and I am still doing that at age forty-seven.

Early on, I learned a lot about countries, currencies, geography, flags, historical figures, etc., and it is very interesting and educational. My local friend is the best local Trivia player and I am usually second or third, so there is some reward for a misspent choldhood. But, I still accumulated everything while realizing that I could not try to collect "everything." I spent a lot of time thinking about what to collect and how to "specialize." I also realized that an album to please me would be difficult, if not impossible, to find.

Just about two years ago, I decided a few things. First, my album will probably be composed of blank, crosshatched pages, organized any way that I wish (maybe even in file folders, by country). Second, my first love is aviation and my main theme ould be aviation and/or airmail from anywhere! I am moderately active in a local model airplane club. However, then I remember that I also love art, engineering, and stamps on stamps, so there is some topical branching out here. In addition, from an investment standpoint, I am interested in older items. I have given some thought to limit my "fun" worldwide collecting to the "first 100 years of stamps - approximately" and my newer items to topical subjects. It seems like a compromise that I can now live with. So, in reality, I am not as much a specialist as I desire to. While I do want to "exchange" some of my duplicates for other items, I have to do something to better organize what I have in order to find out which are duplicates! Sort of a "Catch 22."

I have a few similarly inactive friends: a man to is interested in trains; a female minister who is interested in Bible themes; a brother interested in sports; and decided independently that they were accumulating for retirement. I have two retired friends who are very active worldwide collectors (I've sent them into about ISWSC). I have two pen-pals with whom I correspond in English: one in Poland and one in Czecho-

DOES ALL THIS SOUND VAGUELY FAMILIAR?

ISWSC sounds like something I have been searching for. After visiting the area stamp clubs and talking to members, I joined all three for different reasons. None of the clubs has a newsletter and, as far as I know, only one gets the *Confederation Newsletter (CN)* for members and that is how I saw your ad.

Interestingly, I've answered many ads in the CN, to be told that I was the only one who had responded. The readership is a mixed lot, as I understand. New York state stamp clubs have the option of whether their members receive it, based on not giving out the members' addresses or not spending club money to have it mailed to members.

I joined the first club because they seemed the friendliest, and I met one special new friend during the first meeting I attended. In addition, they meet above a small restaurant, so it is possible to get something to eat if you don't get home for dinner. But, they are a very small (attendance usually 10 -14), far away, and they do not have member auctions, trade night or a "mixture or kiloware" night.

Then I joined a second club because of a friend who is very active in several area clubs and even presents programs to clubs within a 100 mile radius. This is the largest (usually 20 - 24 in attendance), always has an auction or two, sometimes a mixture night, but they seem fairly "stuffy" and most members are very specialized with many "cover" collectors. I have no interest in covers and felt out-of-place. Then I joined a third because of another friend from church, but I found them to be the "stuffiest." They are intermediate in size, and very inconvenient for a meeting location.

All the clubs have two meetings a month with a program, Christmas parties, and do not meet in the summer. Spouses usually do not attend meetings or parties. None has a newsletter or any kind of correspondence, that I am aware of. That is one of the reasons I enjoy CN, because it serves as a newsletter for all, especially with the calendar of meetings.

Many of the older members seem to thrive on the meetings as a source of social contact and many of the older members stick together closely, so adult newcomers feel left out or mildly intimidated and I can imagine how youngsters would feel.

Most of the clubs' program topics are by a specialized collector on their particular specialty and usually very well done. Honestly, however, over the past two years I have only been interested in two or three programs. I travel a fair amount, am active in a church organization, and am not eager to go to more meetings. So, from a club's viewpoint, I have been a poor member and I will probably rejoin only one, in order to continue receiving the *CN*.

One of my near term goals was to give away some of my less valuable duplicates, especially the recent issues from around the world. A longer range goal is to trade, some my more valuable duplicates. For the older part of my collection/accumulation, of course, I would have to do some organizing in order to do that, but I look forward to it.

ISWSC has a newsletter (I don't need a glossy or every month, but it is nice to communicate) and ISWSC does NOT have meetings. There are a lot of exchange clubs advertising in Linn's, but I have not found one that I really like. Most seem too high pressure or expensive for me, and do not seem to have many options. On the other hand, ISWSC has an outlet for youth, (I would like to see an



All in the name of preventing the crime of stamp washing - seems to me the postal service ought to be working on better inks and papers to prevent stamps from being washed and reused.
